Susana (Bales) Roberts, was born in Bay Co., Mo., Jan. 3, 1840. She was married to James T. Roberts March 4, 1859. In October, 1873 they moved to Sweetwater, Sherman county, Neb. where they settled on a Homestead. Mr. Roberts died Feb. 26, 1885. Mrs. Roberts resided with her son William and family on the homestead until Feb. 13, 1902 when she died at the age of 62 years, 1 month and 13 days.

The funeral service was conducted by W. R. Hodges, the text being taken from St. Johns Gospel, xix chapter, xxx verse: "It is finished." During the early days of settlement Mrs. Roberts with her children was much of the time alone as her husband was compelled to make a living by teaming to and from Kearney, giving cedar timber in exchange for flour, groceries and other necessities of life.

Mrs Roberts was very much loved by all who knew her. Her remains were buried in the Ravenna cemetery.

Wolves Still Plague France. We are accustomed to thinking of France as a country every inch of which is settled and cultivated and to regard the wolves which once swarmed in that fair country as having vanished long ago. But it seems that wolves still are numerous and destructive to life and property. So rapidly did the wolves increase after the war with Germany that in 1882 a law was passed offering a reward for every one of these animals killed. Since the institution of these premiums nearly 9,000 wolves have been killed and over \$130,000 has been paid out in premiums. Last year there were 115 wolves killed. For killing a she wolf with young \$30 is paid; for a full-grown wolf of either sex \$20, and for whelps \$8 apiece. In medieval times wolves were the great pest of France. They killed people at the very gates of Paris and were even known to prowl about the city streets at night.
