DEATH SUDDEN AND UNEXPECTED.

William Baillie, of Westerville, Custer county, but once a resident of this place and one of the best known of our old time settlers, died at his home, three miles west of Westerville on Wednesday last week, March 5th, 1902, the result of a fatal accident by falling while getting down from a load of hay. Mr. Baillie was the brother of Mrs. T. S. Nightingale and A. L. Baillie of this place, and J. L. Baillie of Fremont and of Mrs. Jas. Gouley of Custer county and also has a sister, Mrs. Frank West, living at Boston, Mass. He was also an uncle of Mrs. W. J. Fisher and Mrs. Geo. E. Benschoter, of Loup City. All his relatives from here attended the funeral which took place in the large church, at Westerville, at 3:30 p. m. Thursday, March 6th.

Mr. Baillie was enjoying his usual good health right up to the time of the accident. He had been helping his son Raymond haul hay all day and they had just hauled in the last load for the day when, in getting down off the load his foot caught in the rack and losing his hand hold at the same time fell violently to the ground. He struck on the back of the head. Although somewhat stunned at first he was soon able to get up and walk to the house. In a little while he was feeling much better and ate some supper. After supper he sat in his chair and read the newspaper, but as the evening wore on his head began to pain him and he told his wife that he was going to bed. He had scarcely made a move to do so when the pain suddenly increased, and straightening out in his chair, exclaiming "Oh my head," and called for water. Mrs. Baillie went to his aid but he became unconscious and never spoke again. Medical aid was summoned as quickly as possible, but all efforts to save him failed and he died Wednesday morning at 2 o'clock, living over 48 hours after losing consciousness.

Mr. Baillie was nearly 55 years of age at time of death. He was born in Scotland and moved to Canada with his parents when about 16 years old. In 1866 he came with his parents to Michigan and in 1868 they moved to Illinois. He came to Nebraska in 1870 and settled in Cass county, and in 1875 came to Sherman county where he resided for several years. He conducted a store and was post master at Loup City for a number of years and was married here to Miss Sadie Lefler on December 21, 1880. He has for many years past been a resident of Custer county, and served the town of Westerville as post master under both the Harrison and Cleveland administration. He has of late years been in the drug business and was post master at Burwyn, Neb. but had, a short time before his death disposed of his interests there and had turned his attention wholly to farming.

He was a man without enemies and unimpeachable honor, and will be greatly missed by all who know him and who mingle their sorrow with that of the bereaved family and relatives. Mr. Baillie was a loving husband and father and was affectionate to all his relatives.

Rev. W. E. Mathews of Westerville preached the funeral sermon and the Masonic order, in the presence of more than two hundred people performed the last sad rite at the cemetery.

He leaves a wife and two sons to mourn.
