

It is a heavy cropper, a fairly reliable yielder, easily picked, continues many years in profitable fruitfulness, and generally is in good demand. Its disadvantages are softness for long-distance shipment, a slight tendency to scald, and a season of fruiting that brings it into direct competition with peaches. However, this real disadvantage of season often becomes a decided advantage during a short peach crop. which often occurs.
