DOCTORS IN MADAGASCAR.

French Establishing Free Dispensary Service Throughout Island.

The French have just begun to carry out a great work of humanity in Madagascar. Medical missionaries were until recently the only doctors in the island. The Governor General several years ago established a school of medicine and a hospital at the capital. The medical school has already turned out fifteen native physicians who have proved themselves competent to practice medicine. With his practice medicine, the Governor General now expects widely to extend the when such machine is in use service. He has therefore decreed that all branches of the medical service in the island shall be consolidated in one organization and that hospitals similar to that in Antanaaccommodated at one time and where shall be established in the larger towns. PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

The following proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 4,

A Joint resolution proposing to amend section one of Article flifteen, of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, relative to the manner of submitting and adopting amendments to the Constitution of the State of Ne-

Be it Resolved and Enacted by the Legislature of the State of Nebraska:

Section 1. That section one of Article fifteen of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska be amended to read as fol

Section Either branch of the leg islature may propose amendments to and if the same be this Constituuion, agreed to by three-fifths of the members elected to each house, such proposed amendments shall be entered on the Journals, with the yeas and nays, and published at least once each week in at least one newspaper in each county where a newspaper is published, for thirty days boards that they could defeat the immediately preceding the next election bonds, by putting up \$450 retain. of senators and representatives, at which election the same shall be submitted to the electors for approval or rejection, and if costs, agregating nearly \$900.00 a majority of the electors voting at such elction on such proposed amendment, shall vote to adopt such amendment the same shall become a part o of this Constitution.
