MIDWINTER EXCURSION TO FLORIDA.

New Plague Worrying Citizens of Pennsylvania Town.

The bug alights on its victim, perforates his cuticle in one or more places and gets away. In an incredibly short time a large white blister arises and unless prompt measures are taken to counteract the effects of the poison the flesh begins to swell and become painful. Cases have occurred where a bite on the finger has caused the arm of the victim to swell to almost twice the natural size from the bite to the shoulder. Several cases have been severe enough to require the services of a physician.
