The historic hill of Tara in County Meath, Ireland, which was sold at auction Thursday to an unknown woman, was closely identified with the early history of Erin and was the seat of the Irish kings at one time. From its crest was taken the famous coronation stone which is now in the throne of Edward the Confessor in Westminster abbey, having been carried thence from Scone, where it was used as the throne of the Scottish kings. The last great Irish gathering on Tara hill was in 1843, when Daniel O'Connell addressed a great assembly in favor of the repeal of the union.


