

Call For Republican County Convention.

The Republican electors of Sherman County, Nebraska, are hereby requested to send delegates from their respective townships to meet in convention at Loup City, Nebraska, Friday, August 14, 1903, at 11 o'clock a. m. for the purpose of electing six delegates to the State Convention to be held at Lincoln, Nebraska, on the 18th day of August 1903 and six delegates to the Judicial Convention in and for the 12 Judicial District of the State of Neb., and for the purpose of nominating a County ticket, as follows:

- County Clerk. Treasurer. Sheriff. Judge. Surveyor. Coroner. Assessor.

and to elect a chairman of the county central committee, and to transact such other business as may properly come before said convention.

The several townships are entitled to representation as follows; the apportionment being based upon the vote of the last general election (1902) for Hon. John H. Mickey, for Governor, giving each township one delegate for every seven votes or major fraction thereof, and one delegate at large for every township, which gives the respective townships the following representation:

Caught A Horse Thief.

The paragraph below which is taken from the Shelton Clipper shows what a man with a telephone can do and how nicely and quickly he can do it:

"Friday of last week a man came along from the east with a horse and buggy and stopped at the livery stable of Kirthcart & Son, at Shelton, offering the outfit for sale for \$50. Kirthcart questioned the fellow closely, and as he told a very plausible story and the rig was not one that a person would suspect had been stolen, Kirthcart bought it paying the man the cash. Saturday morning Kirthcart received a postal card from the sheriff of Platte county stating that a horse had been stolen there Wednesday night, the description given answering to the horse the stranger had sold to him the night

before, and offering a reward of fifty dollars for the arrest and conviction of the thief. Mose started after the fellow on west-bound train No. 27 and at Gibbon he phoned to the station agent at Kearney, from whom he learned that the fellow had purchased a ticket to North Platte and was at the time waiting in the depot for the train. Mose then telephoned to Sheriff Sammons who arrested the fellow and the sheriff of Platte county was notified and came up and took the man back. Saturday afternoon a man named Cisco, who lives a few miles southwest of Columbus came and claimed the horse, stating that it had been stolen from his place. The buggy and harness had been stolen at a point between Columbus and Shelton. When the fellow was arrested he had \$46. of the \$50, which Kithcart paid him for the outfit, and this he turned back to Kithcart. The fellow gave the name of Frank Edle and claimed to be from Colorado, but he told conflicting stories so it is probable that the name given is a fictitious one."

Reynolds of this city. 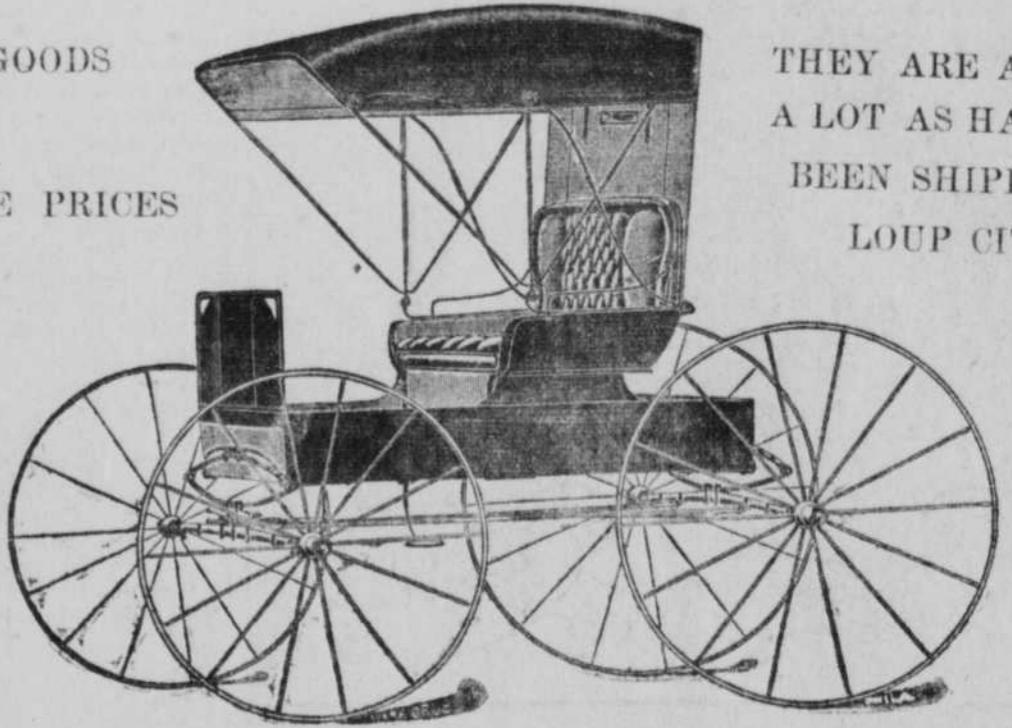
