

Call For Republican County Convention.

The Republican electors of Sherman County, Nebraska, are hereby requested to send delegates from their respective townships to meet in convention at Loup City, Nebraska; Friday, August 14, 1903, at 11 o'clock a. m. for the purpose of electing six delegates to the State Convention to be held at Lincoln Nebraska, on the 18th day of August 1903 and six delegates to the Judicial Convention in and for the 12 Judicial District of the State of Neb. and for the purpose of nominating a County ticket, as follows:

- County Clerk. Treasurer. Sheriff. Judge. Surveyor. Coroner. Assessor.

and to elect a chairman of the county central committee, and to transact such other business as may properly come before said convention.

The several townships are entitled to representation as follows: the apportionment being based upon the vote of the last general election (1902) for Hon. John H. Mickey, for Governor, giving each township one delegate for every seven votes or major fraction thereof, and one delegate at large for every township, which gives the respective townships the following representation:

Sherman County Pays in Advance.

The above caption, followed by the paragraph below, appeared in double column head lines in the Lincoln Evening News, of July 21st. The News pays a splendid compliment to the Sherman county officers. It says:

"Sherman county has set the pace for all the counties of the state in the payment of its indebtedness. The plethora of cash in the county treasury at Loup City became such a burden in the pockets of the county fathers that they came to the state treasurer yesterday and turned over \$6,000, in cold clammy cash as the principle of the railroad bonds issued, by that county in 1886, and then paid three years interest amounting to \$1,440 in advance for the privilege of destroying the evidences of the county's indebtedness three years ahead of maturity. The bonds have been held as an investment in the permanent school fund and as they bore six per cent interest Mr. Morterson held to them with affectionate importunity.

The bonds taken up are the series of 1886. They were issued to aid in construction of a rail road through the county. Several days ago the county commissioners approached Mr. Morterson with a proposition to pay him the interest on the bonds to date and also the principle. They had evidently heard of the "shortage in the general fund and expected him to jump at the offer like a trout in fly time, but the wily keeper of the state's exchequer refused the offer. Should he have accepted the offer he would have been

obliged to turn around and invest the money on a three per cent basis in order to get other bonds to place in the permanent school fund vault. Finally the commissioners made him the unprecedented offer which was consummated yesterday.

No explanation is given for the action of the Sherman county authorities beyond the fact that they had the money and did not know what to do with it. With an increasing surplus in the safety vaults of the county the commissioners began to feel "chesty" and decided to wipe out the debt.

Sherman county lies out in that part of the state which, a few years ago, was known as the semi-arid region. Those were the days when the population was dwindling at a rapid rate. Now the country is booming again and land values have risen to an unprecedented figure for that section of the state. The payment of taxes which have been delinquent for years and were regarded as hopelessly in arrears, has filled the treasury of the county and having no use to which to put the money the commissioners started out to clear the county slate.

Several other counties have redeemed bonds in advance during the last few prosperous years but hitherto none has come in three years in advance of the date of maturity."

To Straighten the Nemaha

City Engineer A. M. Munn is home from Falls City where he went to look over the ground and to give the people down there an estimate of the probable cost of the changing of the channel of the little Nemaha river from Salem to Rulo. It is a distance of thirty-five miles and can be cut in less than eighteen miles, and reclaim over 25,000 acres of the richest land of Richardson county at a cost not to exceed \$130,000. One place a cut of forty feet will cut of two and a half miles and two and a half miles cut will save fifteen miles. Every year the high water along that river destroys the crops and renders the land almost valueless. The farmers along the river have agreed to form a company and make the change. He will make a map and give them the exact figures in a short time so that the work can be started this year. It is thought that similar action will be taken in Johnson, Nemaha and Otoe counties regarding the other branch of the Nemaha that overflowed last and this year and destroyed the crops in those counties.—Ex.

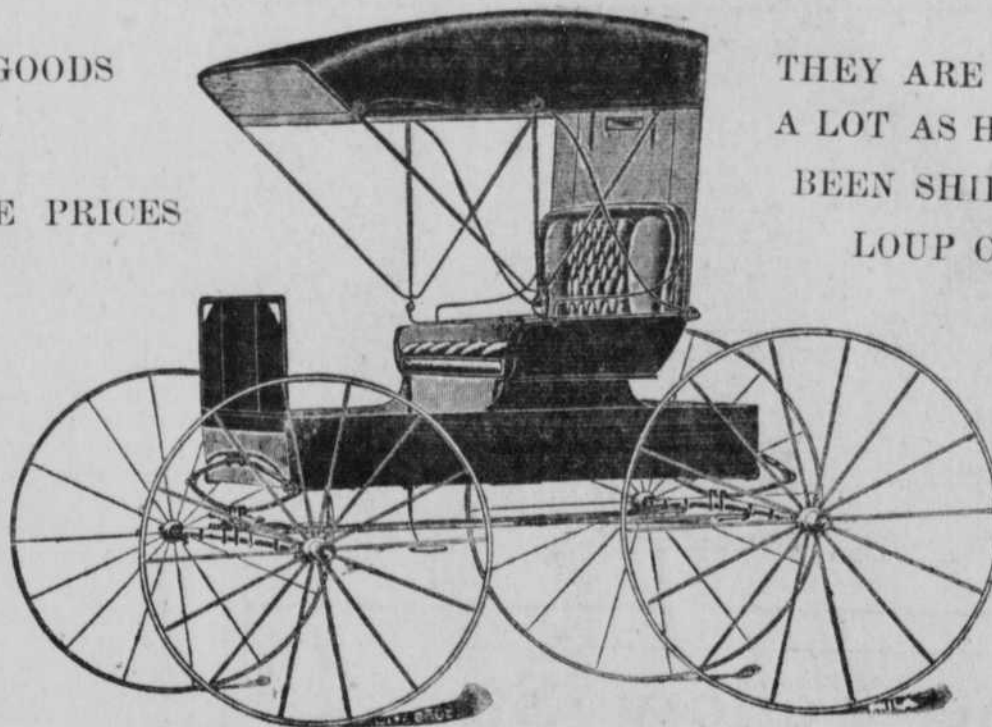
