Reaching the high hill just south of Uncle Ben Nelson's, some eleven miles north of this city, we had a splendid view of the country for many miles up the river which was as beautiful to behold as a summer dream, taking in the great scope of the old Leininger farm of hundreds of acres, Uncle Ben's farm just below us, and the country dotted here and there with houses, barns, beautiful, shady groves, the little school houses, the cattle and horses grazing in the pastures, making a restful and contented feeling to those especially who rarely get away from the business whirl out into the sunlight of God's presence so to speak. Returning the party stopped for a few minutes at the old McKinnie Bros. farm of a half section, now owned by Mr. Leininger, and which is operated by Mr. Willis Holcomb, where we found some of the nicest fields of corn, wheat, rye and oats to be seen during the trip, and Mr. Holcomb is to be congratulated as having the farm in the very best condition in every way. He is evidently an earnest and indefatigable worker, and withal up-to-date in his methods. Here we found a large bunch of Poland Chinas just ready for the market and the hog lots dotted with the black beauties ranging all the way from the size of your double fist up to the big fellows nearly ready for the block, and with comfortable quarters for every one. Mr. Leininger has also a fine bunch of Herefords that would be a pride to any lover of fine stock, and as the editor is partial to White Faces, he thinks that kind of critters the best on earth.
