Boy Killed in Runaway

Five-Year-Old Son of Adolph Newhouser Meets Sudden Death Near His Home

Herman, the 5-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Adolph Newhouser, living on the old Tunisian farm one and one-half miles northeast of Aurora, was killed about 5:30 o'clock last evening in a runaway.

Mr. Newhouser had just returned from Aurora in a lumber wagon with some ice. He had left his team hitched to the wagon, but untied near the windmill. Herman and his two younger brothers, went by just then on their way to the barnyard for some cobs, and Mr. Newhouser watched them to see that they got past the team safely. Evidently the little boy returned, after his father entered the house, and climbed up the wheel to the step on the side of the wagon box. Before he could get further the team became frightened and started to run. The boy clung to the side of the box until the horses jumped the fence about half a mile from the house. When the wagon struck a post he was jarred loose and a hind wheel passed over his head, crushing the skull.

Dr. J. M. Woodard was called immediately and arrived while the boy was still gasping, although he must have been unconscious from the first. Dr. Woodard is coroner as well as the family physician and he decided that the circumstances did not warrant an inquest.

The Newhouser family has been peculiarly unfortunate recently. Only about three weeks ago the same boy, while playing with a 22-calibre rifle, accidentally discharged it and the ball went through the leg of his younger brother just below the thigh. This second affliction is almost more than the grief-stricken parents can bear, and the heartfelt sympathy of the entire community goes out to them.—The Aurora Republican

Deceased was the little son of Dr. J. E. Bowman's sister, Mrs. Bowman going to Aurora to attend the funeral, the doctor being unable to leave certain patients who required his attention. The many friends of the doctor will sympathize with him in the affliction that has come to the family. Mr. Newhouser, father of deceased, recently purchased the James Bone farm south of Loup City and intends removing thereon next spring.

Handcar Accident Injures Two

On Tuesday morning of this week, at Verner's cut, about a mile and a half west of Schaupp's, as two section gangs working out of this city were pulling a dump car to the cut, where they were to do some ditching, and while the cars were only going about 8 miles an hour, the forward car jumped the track, spilling the occupants, breaking three ribs for John Czaplowski, and dislocating an ankle for George Houdysheldt, beside making a deep cut over one eye, requiring several stitches taken therein, and more or less bruising the entire gang that were on the car. Dr. Main was called to the scene, attended the injured, and they were brought in to their homes. So far as we can learn, there was no known cause for the accident, there being no obstruction on the rails, and the track was smooth and even.

Slight Operation.

Last Sunday morning at his home in this city, Mr. A. B. Outhouse had a small growth removed from his right groin by Dr. Dickinson of Rockville, going through the operation without the use of anesthetics and is now getting along so well that he is able to be up and around the house. It takes some nerve to go through even the slightest cutting of the surgeon's knife without the use of opiates.

Fatal Accident Broke His Neck

While going to his home, some eight miles northeast of Loup City, with a load of shingles, last Saturday, Martin Placek, an old man aged 68 years, in some way fell from the load, breaking his neck. Dr. Longacre was called and found the body paralyzed from the neck down. The old man never regained consciousness, but lived till some time the following afternoon before death ensued. The funeral took place Tuesday.

SHOOTING SCRAPE

Glen Farnsworth Shoots Iver Holmberg, Shattering Right Leg Just Below Groin

The Shooting Was Outcome of Trouble Over Money Matters.

About 4 o'clock Tuesday afternoon of this week, Glen Farnsworth, a farmer living some six miles west of Loup City, shot a neighboring farmer, Iver Holmberg, the bullet shattering the bones in his right leg about four inches below the groin. The story of the shooting with the attending circumstances, as reported to us is as follows: There had been some trouble between the parties and ill-feeling engendered over money matters. At the time of the trouble, it is alleged by Farnsworth that Holmberg came to his home, bearing a gun, and after some dispute threatened to shoot him and made attempt so to do, when he (Farnsworth) got quicker action and shot Holmberg in self-defense. Holmberg's story was to the effect that he was out hunting and stopped at Farnsworth's to collect money which he alleged Farnsworth owed him, and denied he intended or made any attempt to shoot the latter. As there were no other witnesses to the tragedy, the statements of the two principals are given for what they are worth. After the shooting, Farnsworth dragged the wounded man into his house and phoned into town after a physician, Dr. Longacre, accompanied by the county coroner, Dr. Main, immediately going to the scene of the shooting where they found Holmberg lying on the floor, with Farnsworth standing guard over him. The physicians made an examination of the wound, which they found as stated above. They then ordered Farnsworth to drive them with the injured man over to the home of the latter which was done. After attending the wound, and Farnsworth promising he would voluntarily come to town the following morning the physicians returned to the city. Wednesday morning, Farnsworth not coming in, a warrant was issued from the county attorney's office, and Sheriff Williams brought him to town, where a perfunctory charge was filed against him and he was placed in charge of the sheriff, pending the outcome of the injury to the wounded man. Mr. Farnsworth is a single man and the possessor of 240 acres of land, and so far as we know this is the first serious trouble in which he has ever been implicated. Mr. Holmberg is a young married man, spoken well of by those who know him. The wound is a serious one, and may result in the loss of his life or the amputation of the limb, and at the least render him a cripple to the end of his days.

Died From Eating Poisoned Berries

Word was received here last week that a former Loup City boy, Lem Bradley, son of the Widow Bradley, who used to live here, but moved up into the sandhills some sixty miles north of North Platte, a few years ago, had met death that week Tuesday from eating some kind of poison cherries which grow in the sandhills. We have learned no particulars, but understand he was with his mother on their claim at the time.
