MINDEN RAISED THE MONEY

A meeting was held last Monday night in the assembly room of the courthouse at Minden for the purpose of raising money towards the survey that has just been completed from Franklin to Kearney on the proposed road to run from Kearney to Beloit, Kansas known as the Canada & Gulf railroad. Mr. Haws, chairman of the local committee made his report. The new survey will be \$50,000 cheaper and leaves out 25 per cent more cuts and fills than the old survey, which runs through Hildreth and then passes about four miles west of Minden.

The new survey cost the citizens of Minden a little over \$400, which was easily raised. Mr. Jenkins, one of the English capitalists, gave the citizens of Minden to understand that they would get the road if they could get as good a survey running through Minden as the old one. The railroad officials will take this matter up about October 9, when Mr. Jenkins is expected to arrive in Kearney from England. He was expected to start the latter part of September.

The townships that the proposed road is to run through have petitioned

the county supervisors to grant them permission to have the question of bonds, which are to be paid when the road is completed, put on the ballot at the general election November 5. If the road is not built the bonds do not go into effect. —Kearney Democrat.

Obituary

Mrs. Minnie S. Alleman was born May 10, 1875, in Chicago, Ill.; being 37 years, 5 months and 5 days of age at the time of her death. She died at the hospital at Grand Island, Nebr., at noon Oct. 5, 1912.

Mr. J. F. Snyder brought her and her brother, Albert, to Nebraska thirty years ago this month. They were adopted into the family of J. M. Snyder, where they made their homes till each married.

She was married to Mr. Clark Loyd Alleman on April 25, 1895. To this union were born Loyd Samuel, aged 14 years; May, age 12 years; Albert Earl, who passed away in early infancy, and Mildred Beulah, aged 6 years.

She had four brothers, two older—William Slatke, who visited Nebraska several times some years ago; Albert S. Snyder, our neighbor, and two younger—Herbert Petibord, who lived in this community about seven years ago, and Charles, whom she never saw nor heard from since she was brought west.

The Wiggle Creek community is sorely bereaved in the loss of this dear friend. In early girlhood, she joined the United Brethren church and has been a most earnest follower of her dear Lord ever since.

She was a loving sister and daughter in her adopted home, Mr. J. M. Snyder seeming to love and depend on her as he would were she his birth.

She and her husband built up a home which has been an inspiration to the neighborhood, and a happy place for her children. Her home and loved ones were first in her affection, but she knew a good home was impossible without a good community. From her childhood when she spoke her little "pieces and sang songs" till her last Sunday on earth, she had taken active part in everything that was for the general welfare of humanity. At her death, she was secretary and treasurer of the Ladies' Aid, and secretary of the W. C. T. U. She acted as Sunday school superintendent at different times, was teacher of the Bible class for a year and always ready to supply in every need.

She was so even in temperament, so kindly in sympathy, so generous in spirit, so loving and tender to all God's creatures, words fail when we try to describe her place in the community. Life is richer and better to each for having known her. She was never vigorous in body, but she gave her best to every cause.
