Ordinance No. 93

An ordinance providing for a Special Election to submit the question of legalizing the playing of base ball in the city of Loup City, Nebraska, on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, providing for the time and place of holding said election, and appointing clerks and judges, hereof, and providing for the form of ballot to be used, and the posting of notices of the time, place and purpose of said special election.

Be it ordained by the mayor and members of the city council of Loup City, Nebraska: Section 1. A special election will be held and had on Monday, the 26th day of May, A. D. 1913, for the purpose of submitting the question of legalizing the playing of base ball on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, providing for the time and place of holding said election, and appointing clerks and judges, hereof, and providing for the form of ballot to be used, and the posting of notices of the time, place and purpose of said special election shall contain the following:

For Sunday Base Ball... Yes []
For Sunday Base Ball... No []
Section 2. The place of holding said special election in the First Ward shall be the place of holding said special election in the Second Ward shall be the Herman Jung's hotel office, and the polls at each of said places shall be open from 9 o'clock in the forenoon until 6 o'clock in the afternoon of said day.

Section 3. The clerks of said election for the First Ward shall be and are hereby appointed, to-wit: Peter Rowe, Lawrence Lofholm, and the judges in and for the First Ward shall be and are hereby appointed, to-wit: Jeremiah Shetler, Jacob Albers, Henry Dumker. The clerks of said election in and for the Second Ward shall be and are hereby appointed, to-wit: Ward Ver Valin, E. B. Corning, and the judges in and for the Second Ward shall be and are hereby appointed, to-wit: Matthew Janulewicz, Earl Thompson, A. L. Zimmerman.

Section 4. Notice of the time and place and the purposes of said special election shall be posted for ten (10) days in the four most conspicuous places and in four of the leading business places in Loup City, Nebraska.

This ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.

Ordinance No. 94

An ordinance to regulate the speed of motor vehicles, motor cycles and automobiles upon any of the public streets and public highways within the city of Loup City, Nebraska, and providing a penalty for the violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance.

Be it ordained by the mayor and members of the city council of Loup City, Nebraska:

Section 1. It is hereby made unlawful for any person to operate, run or drive any motor vehicle, motor cycle or automobile upon any of the public streets and public highways within the city of Loup City, Nebraska, at a greater or faster rate of speed than twelve (12) miles an hour, and when crossing any intersection of streets, or public highways within said city said motor vehicle, motor cycle or automobile shall not be operated, run or driven at a speed exceeding six (6) miles per hour.

Section 2. Any person, or persons, found guilty of any violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance shall upon conviction be fined in any sum not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50.00) or be imprisoned for a term not exceeding thirty (30) days, or both, at the discretion of the court, and costs as provided until said fine and costs are paid.

Section 3. This ordinance shall be in force and take effect from and after its passage, approval and publication according to law.
