The terms are 3 months and usual 10 per cent.

Condemns Basement

Last Saturday evening a petition signed by eighteen of the patrons of our city schools, who have children in the first and fourth grades, was presented to the Board of Health asking that they condemn the basement rooms of the public school building as unfit for educational purposes and giving a number of good and sufficient reasons why such condemnation should be ordered. As three members of the school board were out of town nothing could be done, as the Board of Health wished to take the matter up with that board before taking any action. It is thought, however, the final outcome will be strenuous effort to provide wholesome and sanitary places for these grades, at least by the time cold weather sets in, as all concede the health of pupils and teachers demands the non-use of said basement. At present, and until cold weather requires the heating of the school building, it is believed the basement may be safely occupied by these grades and by that time either a better place will be provided, improvements made in the ventilation, light and heat in this basement, or in event of these things not being done satisfactorily to all concerned, the Board of Health may order the basement closed.

Big Business Change
