HUERTA SENDS MESSENGER TO WASHINGTON.

## SOME OPPOSE HIS RECEPTION

Will Likely Gain Audience Because of Courtesy Shown Mr. Lind by Mexico.

Washington, D. C .- Developments in the Mexican situation probably will await the arrival in Washington of Manuel De Zamacona e Inclan, personal envoy of the Huerta government, to continue with the Washington administration the negotiaeions begun by John Lind, personal representative of President Wilson in

Administration officials had not de cided whether they would receive Senor De Zamacona unless he brought positive assurances of year. Huerta's elimination from the situation in Mexico and was ready to act upon the other points in the American proposals for the establishment big time. of peace.

Some of the Washington officials feel that the United States has made its position sufficiently clear through the parleys conducted by Mr. Lind and the address of President Wilson to congress. Further negotiations on the same points they regard as useless and merely a process of delay. There is a disposition, however, to receive Senor De Zamacona in view of the courtesy shown Mr. Lind.

Senor De Zamacona's mission is said to contemplate not only the furtherance of the negotiations looking toward peace, but the floating of a loan that would be encouraged by the American government.

Senor De Zamacona's departure felt over his condition. from Vera Cruz took Washington officials somewhat by surprise, for while the suggestion had been made to them by the Huerta government | the first time in its history. that he might be sent to Washington to conduct further negotiations, the Huerta administration ordered him to proceed to the United States without awaiting the answer of the American government.

#### Thaw Gains More Time.

Dr. Herman Schneider Says Mental Lethargy Is Due to Mechanical Devices.

Cincinnati O - Dr Herman Schnei-

der of the University of Cincinnati in a report on New York vocational schools submitted to the board of estimates and apportionment, said that mankind is rapidly dividing into "a staff of mental workers and an army of physical workers," and that the minds of the latter are becoming lethargic. The mental development of those who enter the machine-feeding occupations, he said, is the serious problem that confronts the public schools. "Energizing work is decreasing: enervating work is increasing," he said. "The physical workers are becoming more and more automatic, with the sure result that their minds are becoming more and more lethargic. The real menace lies in the fact that in a self-governing industrial community the minds of the majority are in danger of becoming less capable of sound and serious thought." He said that work on farms, railroads and in the building trades where the labor is done outdoors, is energizing. The labor of a toolmaker, locomotive assembler and cabinet maker, indoors press operator, the paper-box maker and the shoemaker are enervating. work also creates a mental stimulus.
