

Sunday School Convention.

Report of Sherman County Sunday School Convention held at Loup City, November 17 and 18. The following is the program:

Wednesday afternoon—Prayer service led by Rev. F. D. Kennedy. After a few short talks on the topic "The Work of the Sunday School," Miss Mamie Haines of Lincoln, gave an interesting "Primary Hour." A good many of the children were present and the speaker held their attention in a way seldom seen.

Wednesday evening—Praise service led by Mrs. Geo. Longstaff of Ashton. Prof. Stedley, field secretary gave an interesting talk on state work and our needs for the coming year. He advised us to divide our county off in districts and promised he would assist in holding two conventions or institutes some place in the county the coming year.

Thursday morning—Opened by prayer and praise service by Rev. Kennedy. Every Sunday School problem led by Rev. Geo. Longstaff of Ashton, which was followed by general discussion. Round table conducted by Rev. A. L. Zimmerman. Rev. Kanzler not being present then Bro. Zimmerman took his place and the topic "Pressing Toward the Mark for the Coming Year" was discussed to the close.

Thursday afternoon—Song and praise service by Mrs. Douglas of this city. 2:30 reports of officers present to wit: J. A. Angier, president, Mrs. Hoover, Treasurer. The reports were accepted and adopted. The following schools reported, all showing advanced gain to the past year: Loup City Methodist by C. J. Tracy; Loup City Baptist by J. A. Angier; Ashton Presbyterian by Rev. Longstaff; Austin by Geo. Chapman; Verdunite by Rev. Madely; Cleora by Rev. Zimmerman.

Thursday evening—Praise service by E. G. Taylor. Report from the State Convention by Mrs. S. S. Hoyer which was very interesting and instructive to all. The following committee was appointed by the chairman to divide up the county into districts and plan systematic work for the coming year in accordance with the request of Mr. Stedley: C. J. Tracy, A. L. Zimmerman, E. G. Taylor and J. A. Angier. Resolutions were passed thanking Prof. Stedley and Miss Haines for their excellent help during the convention; also visiting delegates who had attended.

ANOTHER REPORT.

The Eighth Annual Convention of the Sherman County Sunday School Association was held in Loup City Wednesday and Thursday of last week in the M. E. church and those who were privileged to attend enjoyed every session, especially the talks by our State Secretary Prof. H. M. Stedley and Miss Mamie Haines. The former needs no introduction to the people of Loup City.

If more of our people would avail themselves of the opportunity to hear and learn of so able a teacher as Prof. Stedley and to hear Miss Mamie Haines (our primary worker,) and see her demonstrations on the blackboard is like an oasis in the desert, so fresh and crisp she held the audience spellbound while going over the lesson on the Twenty-third Psalm. The school children of the primary department had been invited to come in after school, seventy-five or eighty responded and were captivated with the instructions. We wondered if they drew comparisons. If our Sunday school teachers throughout the county would avail themselves of these Sunday school conventions it would be a blessing to their classes and an inspiration to themselves.

Rev. and Mrs. Longstaff of Ashton, rendered valuable assistance, come again.

There was a committee appointed to disject the county composed of A. Angier, E. Taylor and A. Zimmerman. Prof. Stedley urged this for the better county work. He also promised to be at two of these district conventions. We missed our County Secretary very much.
