AMENDMENT. The following proposed amendment to, an convention for the revision of, the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth, in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 8,

(SENATE FILE No. 114.) A Bill for a Joint Resolution recommend to the electors of the state to vote at the next election of members of the Legislature for or Bonded Abstracter against a convention to revise, amend and change the Constitution of the Sate of Nebraska in accordance with Section 2, Article 15, of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF

Only set of Abstract books in county THE STATE OF NEBRASKA: 1. That it is deemed necessary to call a con vention to revise, amend and change the Con stitution of the State of Nebraska

2. That the electors are recommended Legislature for or against a convention to re vise, amend and change the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

That at such next election of members of the Legislature on the ballot of each elector voting at such election, shall be printed or written in such manner that the elector can in dicate his preference under the law the words: "FOR calling a convention to revise, amend and change the Constitution of the State of Ne braska," and "AGAINST calling a convention to revise, amend and change the Constitution of the State of Nebraska"; and if a majority tion, the Legislature shall, at its next session provide by law for calling the same.
