PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT.

The following proposed amendment to, and convention for the revision of, the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, as hereinafter set forth, in full, is submitted to the electors of the State of Nebraska, to be voted upon at the general election to be held Tuesday, November 8, A. D. 1904.

(SENATE FILE NO. 114.) A Bill for a Joint Resolution recommending to the electors of the state to vote at the next election of members of the Legislature for or against a convention to revise, amend and change the Constitution of the State of Nebraska in accordance with Section 2, Article 15, of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEBRASKA: 1. That it is deemed necessary to call a convention to revise, amend and change the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

2. That the electors are recommended to vote at the next election of members of the Legislature for or against a convention to revise, amend and change the Constitution of the State of Nebraska.

3. That at such next election of members of the Legislature on the ballot of each elector voting at such election, shall be printed or written in such manner that the elector can indicate his preference under the law the words: "FOR calling a convention to revise, amend and change the Constitution of the State of Nebraska," and "AGAINST calling a convention to revise, amend and change the Constitution of the State of Nebraska"; and if a majority voting at said election shall vote for a convention, the Legislature shall, at its next session, provide by law for calling the same.

4. Geo. W. Marsh, Secretary of State of the State of Nebraska, do hereby certify that the foregoing proposed amendment to the Constitution of the State of Nebraska, and providing for a Convention for the revision of said Constitution of the State of Nebraska, is a true and correct copy of the original enrolled bill passed by the Twenty-eighth session of the Legislature of the State of Nebraska, as it appears from said original bill, on file in my office, and that said proposed amendment and revision of the Constitution of the State of Nebraska is submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Nebraska, for their adoption or rejection, at the general election to be held on Tuesday, the 8th day of November, A. D. 1904.

In testimony whereof, I hereunto set my hand and affixed the Great Seal of the State of Nebraska. Done at Lincoln this 5th day of July, in the year of our Lord One Thousand Nine Hundred and Four, of the Independence of the United States the One Hundred and Twenty Ninth and of this State the Thirty Eighth.

Endorsed by Judge Sullivan. When the new revenue law was before the supreme court last year, under attack by insurance companies Chief Justice Sullivan, democrat, writing the opinion said:

As whole we believe the law to be a good one, and to have been framed with the object of reaching all property in the state, and to impose on all taxable property its due share of the public burden.

In the face of this statement the fusion convention declared in favor of the repeal of the law. Chief Justice Sullivan spoke honestly and fearlessly his opinion from the bench of the supreme court, and the delegates in the fusion convention spoke a sentiment which they thought would appeal to the money lender, the corporations and the farmer in the eastern part of the state who preferred to continue paying state taxes on one-fifteenth or one-twentieth of the fair value of his property.

The revenue law only affects the state tax, as the rest of the tax is levied by the township, school district and county boards. Don't be misled by figures given out by the opposition, laying all increase in your taxation to the new revenue law. Look to the levy by county, township and school boards.
