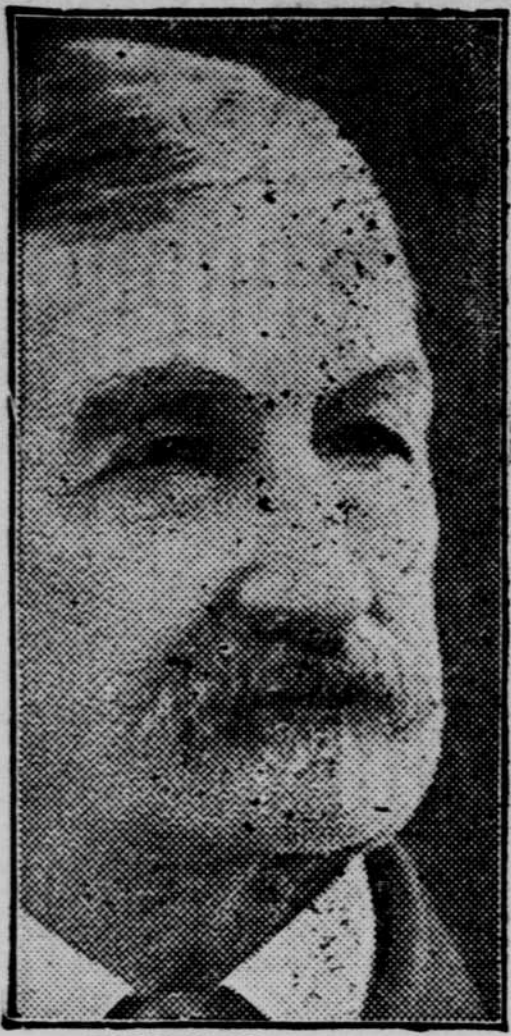

Coal Fields of Spitzbergen.
The coal fields of Spitzbergen, after experimental mining in previous seasons, have been found of sufficient value to justify more extensive operations. An expedition has been fitted out at Sheffield, England, in which also some Norwegian capital is invested. About seventy men are engaged. It is the intention to erect eleven large buildings to be used for lodgings, sheds for machinery, etc.

Meaning of Prison Sentences.
Lord Justice Mathew of England, speaking at a meeting of the Catholic Prisoners' Aid Society, said that when he first became a judge he asked a certain prison governor what it really meant to a man to be sent to a convict prison. The reply was: "Five years do not hurt him much, especially if he is a young man. But seven years means utter ruin to him."

Swordsmanship in England.
Swordsmanship in one or the other of its forms is making marked progress in England. New salles d'armes are being opened and fresh clubs formed year by year in London and the provinces, and international matches have been arranged in which the English teams at least borne themselves well.

Tending to Foot Gear.
To keep shoes between seasons it is best to wash off the blackening and rub vaseline or neatfoot oil into the leather until it feels very soft. Then rub on the oil and put the shoes on "shoe trees" or else stuff the toes with paper. Cover them separately with tissue paper and pack away.

STOLEN GEMS HARD TO SELL.

Man Who Stole Tiffany Diamonds Gathered in a White Elephant.
In the opinion of Detective "Charles" Heidelberg, the man who stole the great Tiffany diamonds has a white elephant of prodigious size on his hands. While the stones represent a fortune in themselves, there is absolutely no way in which the thief can dispose of them without subjecting himself to immediate capture. The only satisfaction left him is to gaze at the gems in the solitude of his home and weave dreams about great possibilities contained in those three sparkling bits of carbon.

"All the diamond cutters in the world may be numbered on the fingers of both hands," said Heidelberg. "They have all received accurate descriptions of the stones and if they are presented to any of these experts to be cut, the person in whose custody they are will immediately be arrested. "Some days ago it was reported that there was a diamond cutting expert in Pittsburg who had not been included in the official list. An investigation was made at once and the report proved to be false. There is one cutter in Chicago, but none nearer. The description of the missing gems has been scattered broadcast, and so much publicity given to the matter that even the most daring 'fence' would not take the diamonds at a tithe of their value. "In my opinion, the theft was not the work of an outsider," added the detective. "The stones were taken by some one in the store who was familiar with the methods of the establishment."

CORN BREAD FAR THE BEST.

The Little Used as Food in Country Where it is Indigenious.

"It is a great pity," said Judge Hutchings of Muskego, I. T., "that the great mass of American people fail to appreciate the marvelous nutritive value of corn bread, which is the sure-enough 'staff of life' and which is far and away superior to the bread that is made of wheat or any other kind of grain. I am saying this not from an academic viewpoint, but from personal knowledge, based on years of observation and experience. "Any old hunter will tell you that corn bread fed to his foxhounds will enable them to pursue the game longer and farther than any other food, and it is the universal rule of owners of packs to give their dogs all the corn bread they can eat before starting on the chase instead of meat or wheat bread. The tremendously long journeys that our North American Indians have been known to make afoot could never have been accomplished on any other kind of rations. "The man who eats corn bread regularly may not know it, but he is following a dietary system that is ideal. Corn bread gives strength to the system, promotes good digestion and is an invaluable ally to nature. It is better far than the rice that the little Japs depend on for sustenance, and yet in the land that is the home of corn the people ignore its virtues."—Washington Post.

Ink Spots on Mahogany.
Ink spots on mahogany may be removed by being touched with a feather dipped in oil and vitriol diluted with twice its quantity of water. The spot should be well and quickly rubbed.

How to Water Plants.
It is much wiser to give plenty of water once every few days than a little each day. The latter method keeps the surface moist and the roots naturally rise for the moisture, so that they are near the surface and will be injured by the heat of the following day. Give enough water to go deep, or else just enough to wash the leaves. The amateur should be preference water at night, for then the moisture has a chance to do its good work before evaporation starts under the heat of the sun's rays, as it does almost at once when watering is done in the morning.—Garden Magazine.

How to Preserve Eggs.
New-laid eggs can be preserved for months by smearing the shells of them with pure glycerine on the same day that the eggs are laid. It is best to place them in a position with the smaller end up. Pure glycerine is much better than butter or grease, as it never turns rancid and thus avoids the chance of spoiling the flavor of the eggs.
