Dr. Edwin Maxey, professor of international law and diplomacy, was born at Royal, Pennsylvania, in 1869. He received the degree of Ph. B. from 9 to 10 Bucknell University in 1893; L.L. B. at Chicago Law School, 1896; L.L. M., 1897; D. C. L. at the Illinois College of Law, 1897; Ph. M. at the University of Chicago, 1899; M. Dip. at Columbia University, 1903, and L.L. D. from the Illinois College of Law in

> Dr. Maxey was president of Palatinate College, 1893-5; lecturer at the Illinois College of Law, 1897-9; Dean of the Aurora Law School, 1898-1900; Dean of the Law Department of Southern University, 1900-1; fellow in

Political Science at University of Wisconsin, 1901-2; lecturer on Colonial Law and Government at Columbia University, 1902-3; professor of Constitutional and International Law, West Virginia University, 1905-6, and since 1906 professor of International Law and Diplomacy at the University of Nebraska.

Dr. Maxey was counsel for the Japanese in the case against the San Francisco school board; is a fellow in the International Society of Intellectuals, a member of Phi Alpha Tau and of the National Geographical Society. He has been associate editor of the Arcna since 1904; has written several article for the American Encyclopedia of Law and monographs on political and legal subjects.
