He is a retired United States army sergeant.

Burdette G. Lewis, '04, has been appointed commissioner of correction of New York, by Mayor John Purroy Mitchel, succeeding Katherine Bement Davis, who has become a member of the new parole board, and with whom Mr. Lewis has been deputy commissioner the last five years. Mr. Lewis-commissionship, which carries a salary of \$7,500, gives him jurisdiction over the largest prison population in the world—6,000—and eighteen institutions, fourteen of which are large, with a budget for 1916 of one and a half million dollars.

Mr. Lewis was prominent in various lines of college life at Nebraska, which he entered in 1900 from the Omaha High School. He was president of the Y. M. C. A., captain of Company E, and was on the debating team that defeated Washington university at St. Lewis in 1904, discussing the Monroe doctrine.

On leaving Nebraska, Mr. Lewis became scholar in economics at Wisconsin university, and there for two years held the \$600 Andrew D. White fellowship in political and social science at Cornell university under Prof. J. W. Jenks. He was special agent of the Interstate Commerce Commission in charge of its "special report on the Intercorporate Relationship of Railroads." Then for three years he was statistician for the public service commission of New York City. In 1910 President John Purroy Mitchel of the board of aldermen, made him examiner on his executive staff—director of investigation of city subways, contracts and franchises, and schools. On becoming mayor, Mr. Mitchel appointed Mr. Lewis to the \$5,000 deputy commissionership of correction.

Mr. and Mrs. Lewis visited Lincoln in September on their way from San Francisco. Mrs. Lewis was Pearl Archibald.
