ANNOUNCE PLANS FOR HIGH SCHOOL FETE DAY

Annual Track Meet to Be Held
May 13

The preliminary announcements of
the Nebraska High School Fete Day,
to be held on Nebraska field, Satur-
day, May 13, were sent out to the dif-
ferent high schools yesterday. The
rules and order of events are the
same as those of last year except
that in order to avoid danger to spec-
tators the hammer throw will be con-
tested on the morning of the meet.

Each high school will be allowed to
enter ten men, but only two contest-
ants from each school will be per-
mitted to start in any event. No in-
dividual entry fee will be required.
Contestants, however, are not advised
to enter more than three events.

The Lincoln Commercial club has
made an appropriation to cover local
expenses in order to insure the re-
taining of the annual state high school
track meet in Lincoln. The univer-
sity will donate Nebraska field and
the various track equipment and every
effort will be made to make the stay
of the high school athletes enjoy-
able.

The total net receipts will be pro-
rated to defray the traveling expenses
of the contestants as heretofore. In
former years it has usually been pos-
sible to pay from 50 per cent to 80
per cent of the expenses of transpor-
tation for all contestants and it is
hoped that this year again such a re-
fund may be made.

Gold, silver and bronze medals will
be awarded to winners of first, sec-
ond and third places and silk badges
to the winners of fourth places.
Places, score 5, 3, 2, and 1 points
for first, second, third and fourth,
respectively. A banner will be awarded
to winning relay teams. Another
banner will be given to the team
winning the highest number of points.

Entries may be made till May 6.
All entries postmarked later than this
date will not be accepted.
