Ray W. Snow indulges in a smart and highly sophisticated monologue, delivered in an easy, nonchalant manner. His talk is spicy without being risqué; he is a moralist without being a bore, and concludes his monologue with a gem of drama.

Elsa Ruegger—one of the joint headliners—is famous as the Belgian cellist. She has played both here and abroad with leading symphony and other musical societies and has won unequalled success on various concert tours. She will be assisted by the celebrated conductor, Mr. Edmund Lichtenstein, and Zhay Clark, harpist.

Kathleen Clifford, making her first American appearance after a solid year in London—where she was the featured performer in two Empire Music Hall revues—is the tiniest of the important women on the American stage, being considerably under five feet in height and weighing only 93 pounds. She has become so well known as the most artistic of boy impersonators that the people sometimes forget her ability in feminine roles. So this season she sings half her songs in smart feminine attire. She is billed as joint headliner with Elsa Ruegger.

Austin Webb, playing the principal role in "Hit the Trail" avers that his play is not a Billy Sunday travesty, but is a "comedy of conscience," a story of those who hit the trail with its comedy and its mirth.
