# **Government Will Not**

Molest Home Food Supply Rumors that the government proposes to tax home-canned vegetables and fruits are still being spread in the state, according to reports received by the Agricultural Extension Service of the University of Nebraska. This time it is Hitchcock county One correspondent( complaining. writes:

"This spring I took up gardening and canning work. I have met with some success, but people have been complaining lately about food inspection.

"Now, please tell me after we have worked so hard to save everything in our gardens by canning and drying or otherwise caring for it, has an inspector any authority to come into our homes and either take or tax this supply ?"

Director C. W. Pugsley of the Extension service blames these reports on German agents or people of pro-German sentiment in the communities.

"There is absolutely no foundation for this rumor," said Mr. Pugsley, 'and there can only be one explanation for it-that people who are working against the government are spreading this statement.

"Every individual who raises, cans, and dries material, or who cans and dries for his own use material purchased in the market, will be unmolested by the government, and as a matter of fact will be greatly encouraged by the government to save everything possible in this way."
