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MILITARY PROGRAM OPENS WITH DRILL

Members of R. O. T. C. Unit Are Given First Taste of Outdoor Work

350 Men Assemble at Armory for First Instructions Wednesday Evening

The R. O. T. C. unit of the University of Nebraska was reorganized yesterday afternoon more than 350 men assembled at the Armory preparatory to receiving final instructions for the semester's military work.

The wheels of the organization were put in motion by Captain Frankforter, who divided the men into companies. One company comprises those who have had no previous military drill and four companies are composed of men who were former members of the S. A. T. C. unit.

Active Drill Work Started

Drill was formally instituted on the streets of the city yesterday and the men kept the cobblestones hot for thirty minutes. The military authorities are very much encouraged by the interest the members are taking in their work. As soon as the rough spots have been polished in the awkward squads the men will be placed in the other companies.

Men who have army uniforms are asked to leave their names at the commandant's office. It is probable that all men possessing uniforms will be permitted to wear them this semester, while the new members will be issued suits through the commandant's office.

Professor Waters Returns—Professor Lena B. Waters, who has been serving as a plant pathologist in the bureau of plant industry at Washington, D. C., has returned to the university and will resume her work here. She will instruct classes in beginning and advanced mycology this semester.
