ELECTION FOR ATHLETIC BOARD IS UNNECESSARY

Schellenberg Withdraws and Remaining Five Candidates Automatically Elected.

The election of the student members to the University Athletic Board has been called off because of the peculiar situation which has arisen. Last Monday six men had filed their names as candidates with Dr. Clapp before the list was officially closed. Since that time one of the six has withdrawn his candidacy, and the remaining five are therefore automatically elected. The following letter from Dr. Clapp clarifies the situation: "Inasmuch as only six candidates for student membership on the University Athletic Board have complied with the requirements of the constitution in filing statements of candidacy, and one of the six candidates (E. H. Schellenberg) has requested that his name be withdrawn, the faculty committee in charge of the election has unanimously decided that no election will be necessary under these circumstances, and have agreed to recommend to the Athletic Board that the five remaining eligible candidates indicated below be declared the student representatives for the coming year: Paul Dobson, Charles Gillilan, Byron McMahon, Richard W. Newman and John C. Pickett.

WYER TO RETURN FROM LIBRARY WAR SERVICE

Mr. W. G. Wyer, head of the Nebraska Library, is expected to return to the University of Nebraska within the next few days. Chancellor Samuel Avery received the following letter Thursday morning from Carl H. Milam, acting general director of the American Library association: "Mr. M. G. Wyer is leaving the Library War Service of the American Library association after having been associated with us for many months. "May I take this opportunity to say to you that few men have been permitted by their institutions to give more generously of their time than Mr. Wyer, and few have succeeded in doing so well the work they have undertaken. We are deeply grateful to you and the University of Nebraska for having made it possible for Mr. Wyer to render this service."

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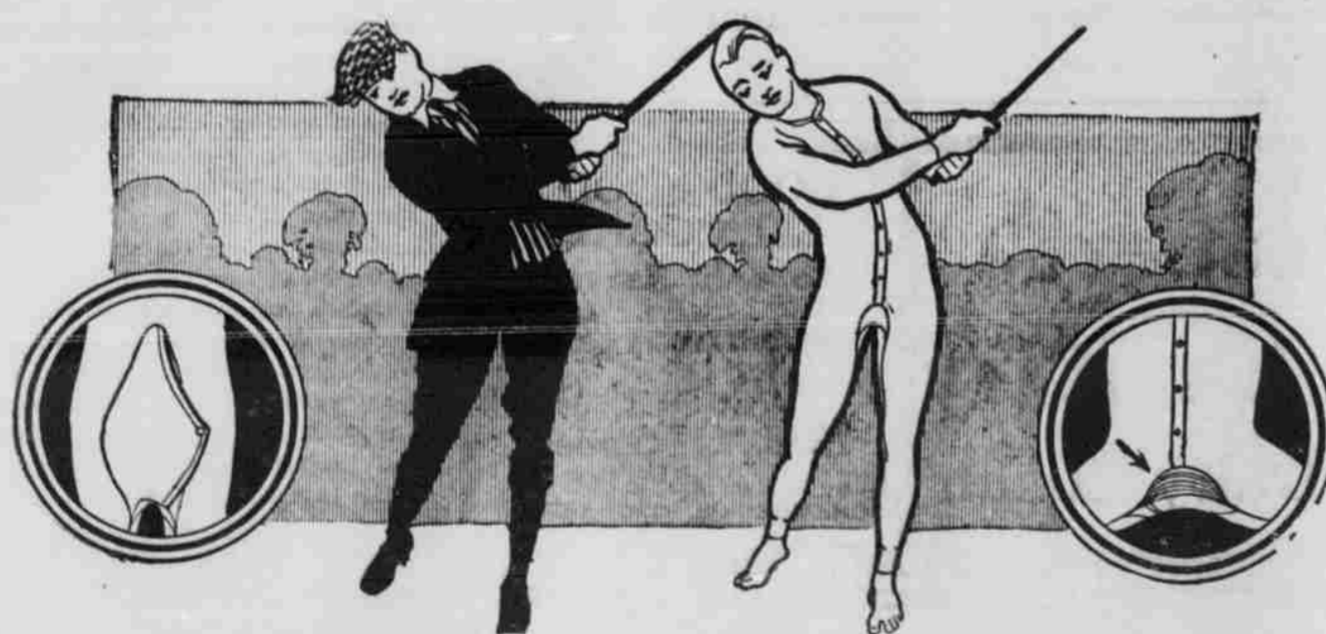


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
