University of Kansas

The Athletic Committee is puzzling over the location of the new stadium which they plan to build this year. A Hoover Club has been organized on the campus with the aim of boosting Hoover's nomination for president.

A mining experiment station of the United States Bureau of Mines is to be established either at the University of Kansas or at the Missouri School of Mines.

The Phi Kappa Psi fraternity which was established at the University of Kansas in 1876, has moved into a beautiful new home which cost fifty thousand dollars. It is a three-story structure and is built of tapestry brick in the Virginia colonial style. It is very large, having a frontage of one hundred feet. The grounds about the house will be arranged in the form of two terraces with an arbor in the rear.

The Jayhawker basketball squad won two games last week from Oklahoma by scores of 33 to 28 and 42 to 26.

Michigan

Michigan has received a \$400,000 library collection of original colonial manuscripts from Regent W. L. Clements.
