

Sjogren to Speak On Tractor Tests

O. W. Sjogren, professor of Agricultural Engineering, will give a lecture on "The Nebraska Tractor Tests" this evening at 8 o'clock in the general lecture room of Bessey Hall at the regular monthly meeting of the Nebraska chapter of Sigma Xi.

Tractor testing was instituted by a law enacted by the legislature in 1919 for the benefit of Nebraska farmers. The results are being watched by other states and foreign countries.

In order to effectively carry out the work a special testing apparatus was necessary and has been designed and constructed by the University. One piece of this apparatus is a dynamometer car, the first of its kind that has ever been built to draw bar work. During the past season sixty-eight tractors have been tested and the results are available to the public.

The meeting tonight is open to the public.

Red Cross Institute For Next Semester

The Red Cross Institute for the training of social workers is to be given in the Department of Sociology again this year. The work was carried for the first time the second semester of last year and from the standpoint of the Red Cross was considered so satisfactory that they have again asked the cooperation of the University.

Nebraska is one of four colleges in the Central Division of the Red Cross giving similar courses, the others being the Universities of Chicago, Iowa and Wisconsin.

The course is open only on approval either by the resident director, a case of University students, or by the educational director of the Central Division at Chicago, in case of non-resident persons. Seniors and graduate students who have specialized in sociology or adult special work with experience in social work are eligible for applications.

Position Open.

The Institute last year had ten students to all of whom paid positions were open upon completion of the course. Among those accepting secretarial positions with the Red Cross were Alberta Oulhouse at Arion, Neb.; Dorothy Wallace at Wyoming, Wyo.; Alice Kittinger at Muskegon, Mich.; and Esther and Ruth Jones at Lincoln.

Students interested in the Red Cross Institute may secure detailed information from the resident director, Professor Williams, at Social Science, 110B.

Judges Says Girls Need "Spanking"

NEW YORK, Dec. 15.—New York girls between sixteen and eighteen years old, who do not go to the continuation schools as required but who instead "come late court painted far more brilliantly than footlight favorites" are in need of a spanking, Magistrate Alexander Brough declared today.

"A good spanking would do them good," he said, neglecting to suggest who should have the task.

Most of the truancy cases, he said, were the daughters of foreign born parents.

"Their mothers try to get them to attend class," said the judge, "but they are laughed at by their haughty, Americanized offsprings."

Clothes of John Brown On Display in Museum

The Archaeological Museum now has on display a collection of articles used by John Brown and his sons, noted abolitionists, in their raids made in Kansas, and in the border states before the Civil War.

The collection consists of wearing apparel worn by Brown and his sons at the time of their death; guns and knives used by them during their numerous raids; bullet molds from which bullets were molded by the wives of the Browns. In addition to these, quite a number of documents of historical importance, including the last letter written by John Brown, and a proposed Constitution of the United States drafted by him are to be seen.

The collection was presented to the society by the granddaughter of John Brown, who is now residing in Ohio—Ohio State Lantern.

Avery Will Address Farmers' Congress
