JUDGE MUNGER TELLS OF WORK OF ATTORNEYS

"The most successful attorneys usually have notes at hand during the trial with similar cases and decisions recorded. Also they usually make notes of the order of procedure and follow them carefully," said Judge T. C. Munger of the Federal Court of Nebraska in his address to the future barristers of Nebraska Law College during the general lecture period, Friday, February 11.

Judge T. C. Munger has been a judge of the Federal Court for the past fourteen years. He previously practiced as an attorney for twenty-one years. He has resided in the city of Lincoln during the past thirty-six years. He is well known and respected throughout the territory surrounding Lincoln. Federal judges play a very important part in the administration of justice in all the important law questions that arise.

Judge Munger's address included many suggestions concerning the practical use of knowledge acquired in the College of Law. In closing he said, "The ordinary small-salaried lawyer usually exceeds his time limit in presenting his case to the court while the practitioner who forges ahead is the one who presents his talk in pre-arranged order, short and to the point."

STEELE HOLCOMBE TELLS OF WORK IN EGYPT

Steele Holcombe, Nebraska University graduate, who is doing Y. M. C. A. work in Egypt has written to his friends at Nebraska about some of his experiences in that country. His letter follows:

"Cairo, Egypt, January 19, 1921.

Dear Friends: "We may now consider ourselves old residents of Egypt, having been here for over a year. If the other five years go as fast as this, it seems almost as though we would be home for next Christmas. All of the seasons have come and gone, although one never hears spring or fall mentioned. The summer lasts about seven months, followed rather abruptly by winter.

"To explain the lack of information which I promised in my last letter, I may say that I have been absent from Alexandria since the middle of December. I had an attack of dysentery, which was followed shortly by rheumatism. Having been cured of rheumatism at the springs in America, I immediately came to Cairo to take advantage of the baths at Helouan, a suburb of Cairo. These are supposed to be the oldest sulphur baths and health resort in the world, where Cleopatra is supposed to have acquired some of her beauty. Whether or not this is true, I am greatly improved from both troubles and expect to return to my work in a short time.

"Needless to say the plans for organization and the rest have been compelled to wait, but it has given the committee an opportunity to

demonstrate its ability and according to reports, it is doing fine work.

"A great forward step has been taken in the decision of the foreign department in New York to send Mr. Wilbur B. Smith to Egypt as the permanent general secretary for Y. M. C. A. work. According to an agreement with the English National Council, the American Y. M. C. A. will have charge of all work for the non-English speaking people, and the British Y. M. C. A. for the English people. It is also agreed that the American secretary in charge will be the senior secretary for all work, so

Mr. Smith will have a big job from the very start. We expect him to arrive the latter part of this month. "Mrs. Holcombe joined me here just before Christmas and we were so fortunate as to be invited to three Christmas dinners. On Christmas eve the Y. M. C. A. gave a big dinner. On Christmas noon, we had our second

with old friends who came over on the same boat with us, and in the evening we had another with some friends from Greece who came over to spend the holidays with us. I was still on a diet but able to get around enough to enjoy them all.
