 Q—When was the Ag. college founded?
 A—The College of Agriculture was established by the act of the legislature of 1909, reorganizing the college within the University.
 Q—How do the victories of Nebraska in football compare with the defeats?
 A—Up to Thanksgiving 1920, Nebraska had played 218 games in its twenty-eight years of football. Of these 159 have been victories and 44 defeats. Fifteen games have resulted in a tie.
 Q—When was the name Sombbrero changed to Cornhusker?
 A—The annual was renamed in 1907.
 Q—When was the Temple erected?
 A—The Temple was built in 1906-7 with money given by John D. Rockefeller, and by citizens of Nebraska.
