Varsity Debating Squad Will Fight Out Only Home Debate of Season

Nebraska's only home intercollegiate debate with South Dakota for 1922 will be fought out Thursday evening in the Temple Theater beginning at 8 o'clock and ending when the audience gets through firing questions—(polite heckling) at the teams.

Nebraska high schools are sending delegations to study varsity methods of debating. The Forum Society of the Lincoln High School, of which Wendell Berge, '25, who will open the discussion, was a member, has engaged a block of nineteen seats.
