Stadium Association Has \$115,000 in Subscriptions and Cash Now on Hand.

HOLD STUDENT DRIVE EARLY IN OCTOBER

Cornhuskers to Be Asked for Uniform Subscriptions-State Campaign Later.

With more than \$117,000 in subscripture will be started within a year.

A monstrous student drive is to be held in October. Every Cornhusker will be asked to contribute a uniform amount of \$25. That sum is the same as each senior subscribed last spring It was settled by a committee of students. The money will be paid in five installments.
