GOOD PROGRAM SCHEDULED FOR OPENING RALLY

Students Should Attend Initial Football Rally in Armory This Evening

UNIVERSITY BAND TO PLAY

Fraternities and Sororities Requested to Attend in a Body - Starts at 7:15

Everyone is asked to come to the "pop rally" tonight at 7:15 in the Armory. Captain "Chick" Hartley will give a short speech and introduce the other members of the first squad. Cheering will be in charge of "Duke" Gleason and Fred Richards. The University band will attend en masse and some spirited music will be provided. Coach Fred Dawson will speak to the students.

Freshmen are especially urged to be present by the upperclassmen, as it will be a good chance to get a glimpse of the University traditions and get acquainted with the members of the team. The rally will start promptly at 7:15 and will be over by 7:45 in order not to interfere with any other activities of the students. A rally on the evening before a game is one of the oldest and most important of the Cornhusker traditions. It gives the team the feeling that the students are behind them and are backing them to the limit. No one can call himself a loyal Cornhusker who does not leave the rally tonight with a throat sore from cheering.

Sororities and fraternities are asked to set an example to the rest of the school by attending in a body. For the Freshmen this will be an opportunity to learn the Nebraska yells and songs before the game tomorrow. It will unite the school in its cheering and give the students a chance to show their support. Chauncey Nelson of the Innocents will preside and introduce the speakers. "The meeting will be short and snappy and give the students plenty of time for their dates or anything else afterwards," he declared. "If the students want the team to win tomorrow, if they are loyal Cornhuskers, they will yell themselves hoarse for the team tonight."

SIGMA DELTA CHI INITIATES TWO MEN

Journalistic Fraternity to Promote Interest Among High School Papers

Two men were initiated into Sigma Delta Chi, men's honorary journalistic fraternity, at the Grand Hotel, Thursday evening. A banquet was held immediately after the initiatory ceremonies. After the banquet, plans were made to secure for the Nebraska chapter the next national convention of the fraternity which will be held in November, 1923. The fraternity will send a large number of delegates to national convention at Manhattan this year in November.

Charles Mitchell, '24, and Mark Werner '24 were initiated into the order. Both men are Juniors in the Arts and Science college. Mitchell is a member of Alpha Sigma Phi and Werner is a Silver Lynx. Mitchell is a night editor on the Daily Nebraskan, and Werner is a reporter on the Nebraska State Journal.

To promote a keener interest in journalistic activities in the high schools throughout the state Sigma Delta Chi voted Thursday night to conduct a contest for the high school newspapers. Two silver loving cups will be presented by the fraternity to the best school papers. The larger schools will be put in Class A and the smaller schools will come under class B. A high school winning the cup three times in succession will be permitted to retain it permanently.

A faculty member will be asked to put the plan of the high school newspaper contest before the State Teachers' Convention which meets in Lincoln next week and endeavor to secure the co-operation of the high school heads. All high school staffs will be asked to send copies of their publications regularly so that the Sigma Delta Chi committee may criticize and comment on them. The cups will probably be presented to the winning high schools in the spring of the year when a great share of the high school editors are in Lincoln at the State Debating tournament usually held in May.

The Nebraska Chapter of Sigma Delta Chi is one of the most centrally located chapters in the United States and this chapter has not yet had a national convention of the fraternity which it is justly due it. An effort will be made to enlist the aid of the Chamber of Commerce to pull for a national convention. Co-operation of the alumni will be strived for.

The active chapter of the fraternity decided at the meeting Thursday night to put out a regular news letter at frequent intervals to the alumni in order to keep in touch with them. Sigma Delta Chi is represented by a large number of alumni in the city and efforts will be made to keep in more proximate touch with them and hold their co-operation with the active chapter.

President Harlan Boyer predicts 1922-1923 to be a fruitful year for Sigma Delta Chi in view of the intense interest displayed by the active men so early in the year.

FORMER HUSKER WRITES ABOUT NEW STADIUM

John V. Cortelyou Sends Spirited Letter to Stadium Committee - Comments On Size

STADIUM MUST BE LARGER

Tells of Building Activities at K. U. and Kansas Agricultural College

John V. Cortelyou, '97 and '01, secretary of the Kansas State Agricultural college Memorial Stadium corporation, Manhattan, Kans. says Nebraska is way behind the times in attempting to build a stadium with a 20,000 seating capacity. (The new Nebraska Memorial stadium is expected to seat closer to 30,000). But read the letter which was written to the editor of the University Journal, monthly magazine for alumni of the University of Nebraska:

"Dear Editor: 'The University Journal arrived a couple of days ago and has been read with much interest mingled with considerable astonishment. 'What's the matter, Alma Mater? 'Raise your sights, Nebraska! 'A stadium of 20,000 capacity is small-town stuff. Why, that's what we are building in our little town of 8,000! Our nearest city is sixty miles away. Our student body is about half that of Nebraska, and the number of our alumni very much less.

"Wake up, Nebraska! Get some vision. 'You should have a stadium that will seat 60,000 people. And then, after you have thus multiplied your stadium capacity by three, you should divide your season ticket charge by the same figure. (It is believed that Mr. Cortelyou means a student charge of \$2.50 for the football season).

"Of course, if you won't do the latter there is no use in doing the former. 'Popularize athletics and thus make the University popular. That will result in giving you a generous legislature and will make possible a development in the power and influence of the University that may now seem impossible.

"A stadium of 60,000 capacity. That's the thing. 'Do you think you can't fill it? Think again.

"Will the railroads quit running? Is the supply of gasoline going to fail. Is Henry going to stop making tin lizzies? I think not. 'Don't you realize that crowds draw crowds and also that the larger crowd results in a better game and that the better game draws a still larger crowd?

"From Lincoln alone you should attract enough people to fill every seat of a 20,000 stadium. And from the towns and country within a half-day's run of Lincoln and from Omaha you'll get the rest of your 60,000. Not right away, perhaps, but within ten years.

"Not for football alone should the stadium be used, but for great pageants and for various other community doings.

"Are you afraid the money cannot be raised? Of course it can. 'You are expecting from the student body \$300,000. Our small student body pledged \$80,000 and will raise this to \$100,000. The quota here was \$40 per student.

"You are expecting \$21,500 from the faculty. Our faculty subscribed \$33,000.

"You're expecting \$150,000 from Lincoln. Aside from the faculty and students whose homes are here, Man-

NEBRASKA-SOUTH DAKOTA CONTEST TOMORROW OPENS 1922 GRIDIRON SEASON FOR CORNHUSKER WARRIORS

COYOTES PREPARED FOR HARD CONTEST

South Dakota Squad Due to Arrive in Lincoln Saturday Morning.

CAPTAIN MAY NOT PLAY

Coyote Squad Has Roster of Star Players - Keen Competition Expected

Vermillion S. D.—(Special to the Daily Nebraskan).—The Coyote squad went through their last practice this afternoon on the athletic field before leaving for Lincoln, where they will meet the Cornhusker squad Saturday afternoon. The red and white warriors, accompanied by Coaches Allison and Eckberg leave Vermillion tomorrow afternoon for Sioux City. They may break the journey at Sioux City with an easy workout Friday evening.

They are due to arrive in the Husker camp Saturday morning. Accompanying the coach will be the eleven men who played in last Saturday's game, and several substitutes. Allison and Eckberg have a number of promising substitutes in case any of the first string men are put out.

The Coyote squad this week completed their fourth week of intensive practice. They took the field on September 4 and have been busy every since. Allison is optimistic, and says his men are in excellent condition. There is no one of the injured list, and the men are toughened from a month's hard work on the gridiron.

Just what Allison expects at Lincoln remains a matter of conjecture tonight, as the squad prepared to leave. The coach intimated that the Huskers would get all that his squad had, and that's considerable, but as to the outcome, the coach was enigmatis.

The lightest man on the red and white squad is Quintal, the heady quarter. He balances the beams at 155 pounds. The Coyotes have a fairly heavy backfield. Dubel tips the scales at 195 pounds. Dugal weighs around 200. Both men are fast. The line is medium heavy, ranging from 165 to 190 pounds.

Soper, captain, who did not get into the game with Yankton last Saturday will accompany the team. McDowell, Sioux Falls all-state star two years ago, who plays quarterback, may be in the lineup Saturday. McDowell's name became legion around Vermillion last fall, when he was the only man who could drive through the Illinois line at Champeign.

The program of the concert is not yet definitely decided but it will be extremely pleasing, with brand-new music that has never been before on the University campus. The program will start at 8:45 and the dance will start at 9, continuing as long as possible.

The band has been making rapid progress this season. It includes sixty of the choicest musical talents on the campus. Director William T. Quick and Captain Buford Gage selected the very best of the candidates that tried out for band this fall. The past two weeks have been spent in working a set of entirely new numbers. According to Captain Gage a number of fast snappy marches have been rehearsed and will be used at the football game. On the campus there has been some criticism in the past two years playing the same old tunes and making the same noise on selections such as the "Old Gray Mare" and a few others.

NEBRASKA GRIDSTERS READY FOR COYOTES

Coach Dawson Puts Finishing Touches on Squad for Initial Contest

GAME CALLED FOR 2:30 P. M.

Huskies to Wear Blue Jerseys—Band to Furnish Music for Game

The 1922 Cornhusker gridiron machine will roll into action for the first time tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 when they meet the South Dakota Coyotes in the opening game of the season on Nebraska field. The Huskers, who have been plugging and grinding for three weeks under the direction of Head Coach Fred Dawson in preparation for this contest, are ready for the Coyote invasion, and they expect to inaugurate the season with a victory.

The hope, of course, favors the Scarlet and Cream eleven. With twenty letter men in uniform, Coach Dawson has had a wealth of material to select the team from. The performance of the first Varsity team against the Freshmen yesterday, when the Varsity scored three touchdowns with ease, also caused Husker stock to take a jump upward. South Dakota, however, may spill the dope bucket, as the Coyotes have the advantage of two weeks more practice than the Huskers, and have already played and won their first game.

Game Called at 2:30

The whistle will sound for the opening kickoff promptly at 2:30. The Nebraska team will be attired in blue jerseys, due to the fact that the South Dakota colors are red and white, and the Coyotes will wear red jerseys.

The South Dakota squad is expected to arrive in Lincoln sometime this morning and take a light workout tomorrow afternoon, consisting of signal practice. Coach Allison's opinion is in the belief for the Nebraska game, and the Dakotans will put up a terrific battle to their effort to defeat the Cornhusker team.

Head Coach Dawson will probably restrict this afternoon's workout to signal drills and practices of formations and shifts. The workout yesterday afternoon was the best that has been held thus far, the Huskers putting lots of fire in the drills, and showing some real stuff in the clash with the Freshmen. The first Varsity scored three touchdowns against the strong Yearling team in about twenty minutes. The Cornhusker defense was working good, and constantly ripped through the fresh line for long gains.

When the Huskers trot on the field for tomorrow's fray, they will be in the best of physical condition. No Husker regular is on the hospital list, and the men have toughened considerably as a result of two weeks of hard scrimmage and long drills.

Coach Dawson is expected to change the Nebraska lineup frequently during the Coyote contest, in order to give the large number of Varsity candidates a chance to show their ability in a real game. Dawson may also see fit to make some last minute changes in the Husker lineup before the game. Every man who will start the game Saturday has already won his letter in football at Nebraska.

Captain Hartley picked up a Yearling fumble soon after the opening of the scrimmage, Thursday, and raced thirty yards for a touchdown. A few minutes later Herb DeWitz intercepted a first-year pass and ran to their five yard line, where Noble went over on a line plunge. The third Varsity touchdown was made when Sherer caught a long pass and ran to a touchdown. Preston kicked goal on the try for point on every touchdown, making the score 21-0. After the Varsity scored the third touchdown, Dawson sent in the second team, which was clearly outplayed by the Freshman, who kept the pigskin near the Varsity goal, but could not push it over.

Following the South Dakota game, the Huskers will rest two weeks before meeting the Missouri eleven on Homecoming day, October 31. This contest will be one of the hardest games of the season, as the Tigers, with the battle cry "Beat Nebraska" ringing in their ears, have visions of the Valley championship. The next Saturday the Huskers will play their first game away from home, when they meet the Oklahoma Sooners at Norman.
