MISSOURI TIGERS HAVE PROSPECTS FOR VALLEY TITLE

To Meet Cornhuskers on Local Field in Homecoming Day Battle

FRESHMEN HOLD 'VARSITY'

Much Interest Taken at Tiger School Over Outcome of Husker Contest

Columbia, Mo., Oct. 3.—Missouri's pre-season football prospects were given a decided adverse jolt Saturday afternoon when the freshmen held the first string 'Varsity material to a long' touchdown and a 7 to 0 victory.

Outweighed in every department, the freshmen fought against great odds and turned the tide of defeat into a veritable victory. A five yard penalty which placed the oval within ten yards of the yearlings goal posts, paved the way for the 'Varsity's only touchdown.

On two other occasions the 'Varsity ran the ball deep into the yearlings' territory, but lacked the drive on straight line bucks and lost the ball on downs.

Both teams resorted to a passing game in the latter stages of the fourth quarter, with the freshmen taking all the honors in this department. Out of five attempted passes by the 'Varsity not one was completed, while the yearlings instituted four and completed two.

While the game was a decided disappointment to the crowd of 2,500 gathered for the contest, it gave the coaches an opportunity to pick out some of the flaws which only a scrimmage of this sort could bring into evidence. Whether the dearth of veteran material in the Old Gold and Black lineup might be termed a flaw, is a matter of conjecture, in any event only two lettermen from last year's squad have thus far answered the call for linemen in the Tiger camp. From one end of the line to the other only two Tiger lettermen, Captain Bunker and Hill, both tackles, will be found in action this season. The pivot position will be filled by Smith, a yearling of last year and the two guard positions by men to be selected from the candidates of the freshmen and 'Varsity squads of last year.

No definite selection has been made for the wing positions, but in any event they will be filled by freshmen or squad members of last year.

In the backfield, the offensive will be built around Allan Lincoln, who has been shifted from fullback to righthalf. With Lincoln in the back field will be Bond, a graduate of last year's freshman crew, who gives promise of becoming one of Missouri's best halfbacks; and Fowler, also a graduate yearling who will be alternated between the full and end stations. In Fowler, the Tigers have a punter of promise and although his kicking has been exceedingly mediocre thus far he is expected to round into shape with the opening of the conference.

Fowler will be ably assisted in the punting game by Johnny Knight, a letterman of last year, who is again to work at his old station as fullback. With the passing of "Chuck" Lewis, last year's quarterback, Elmer Kershaw has assumed the responsibilities of the generalship and thus far has been acquitting himself as a veteran.

"Tony" Bundschu, the only other veteran to answer the call this season, has been out of the lineup for the last two weeks with injuries. His first injury came in the form of a "charley-horse" and in the first scrimmage in which he participated following his recovery he was relegated to the casualty lists with a dislocated shoulder.

The Tigers will be given hard this week in preparation for the first conference game Saturday with Grinnell. With the entire coaching staff and the material new to each other the outcome of the game is pretty much in doubt.
