### NO CLASSES FOR BIZADS; HOLD ANNUAL HOLIDAY

Expect Five Hundred at Field Day; Events Planned for Everyone.

**PARADE FIRST ON PROGRAM**

No classes meet in the College of Business Administration today. Students of the college are taking their annual holiday. The day will start with a parade from the Temple. Because of the classes which will be in session at this time, it is necessary to start the parade at a little distance from the college. The whole day from 9 a. m. until 12 o'clock at night will be given over to festivities. Bizads have been saving their energy to make the day a rousing success.

Twenty-five piece band composed of Bizads will lead the parade and floats provided by business men of Lincoln will brighten the atmosphere. Equipped with horns, whistles and other noise-makers, the Bizads will march up O street shouting praises of their college to the rest of the world. From the business district the parade will head for the Ag college athletic field where the events of the day are to be held.

**Events for Girls.**

Games will be provided for everyone. The girls will not be left out. Stunts and races are being arranged for them. There will be two boxing and two wrestling matches.

The menu for the barbecue is: Hot sandwiches, salad, apples, cider, coffee and pie. Immediately after the lunch, the crowd will proceed to the football field and watch the Ag and Bizad football teams tear up the ground in the premier game of the day.

The Dean, who is captain of the faculty baseball team, has organized a lineup which should furnish the seniors competition. Last year the Dean reported that the faculty would have won the game had it not been for the fact that the umpire was a student. So this year an umpire will be found who has no grudge against any of the professors. So the faculty will be given a square deal. The teams will be provided with indoor baseball equipment.

### UNIVERSITY HAS PART IN ARMISTICE PARADE

**R. O. T. C. Unit and Cadet Band to Represent Cornhusker Institution.**

The University will take a prominent part in the Armistice day parade and celebration tomorrow. The R. O. T. C. band and the entire regiment will participate in the parade down O street at 10 o'clock. Nearly eight thousand will march in the parade, led by Col. H. J. Paul, marshal of the day.

Before taking its place in the parade the regiment will be reviewed by Major General Duncan, commander of the seventh corps area, and the regiment is to receive the oath of allegiance to the flag, administered by Prof. C. W. Taylor, commander of the State Department of Nebraska American Legion.

All ex-service men in the University, either officers or enlisted men, of the student body or faculty, are urged to take their places in the parade tomorrow.

**Ex-Service Men's Banquet.**

At 12 o'clock there will be an ex-service men's banquet at the Chamber of Commerce. General Duncan, after reviewing the regiment and marching in the parade will speak at this luncheon. The general and his staff as well as 100 post commanders of the American Legion will be the guests of the University at the Notre Dame game in the afternoon. They will occupy a special section of the stadium.

Members of the Girls' Cadet Corps from Hastings will also be guests of the University at the game where they will give an exhibition between halves.

At 7:30 in the evening there will be a reception and dance for all ex-service men at the auditorium. All former service men are invited. The admission ticket will be the uniform, or discharge button.

### BIZAD COLLEGE HAS PHENOMINAL GROWTH

Created Four Years Ago, Now Has Second Largest Enrollment.

The College of Business Administration, although still an infant in years, has become one of the leading colleges of business in the country. The college graduated its first class to have studied four years in the school last spring.

Created as School of Commerce by action of the board of regents in May, 1913, and made a part of the College of Arts and Sciences, it was not until 1919 that it was organized as a separate college of the University by an act of the legislature. Today only four years after its organization, the College of Business Administration has the second largest enrollment in the University.

**Dean Is Authority on Economics.**

Dean J. E. LeRossignol, head of the college, was born in Quebec, Canada, in 1866. He received his A. B. degree at McGill College in 1888. He has also received the following degrees: Ph.D. from the University of Leipzig, 1892, Fellow of Psychology from Clark University, 1892. Dean LeRossignol has been given the honorary degree LL.D. by Denver and McGill universities. He was professor of psychology and ethics at Ohio University from 1892 to 1894, and professor of economics at Denver University from 1894 to 1911. He came to the University of Nebraska in 1911 as a professor of economics. He was director of the School of Commerce from 1913 to 1919. When the "Bizad" College was organized in 1919, he was made its dean.

Dean LeRossignol is a recognized authority on economical and psychological subjects. He is also a speaker and author of note. He has written several books on these subjects.

The "Bizad" college is quartered in the Social Science building.

**Enters Business Research Field.**

Courses offered in the college deal mainly with business and economical subjects. The college is active in the field of business research. This service was inaugurated last year and has developed rapidly. Nebraska was one of the first schools in the country to enter this field, following the lead of the Harvard Bureau of Business Research.

There are several student organizations within the "Bizad" college. The most active are the Commercial club, the Girls' Commercial club, and Alpha Kappa Psi which is a national fraternity organized to promote the interests of colleges of this type.

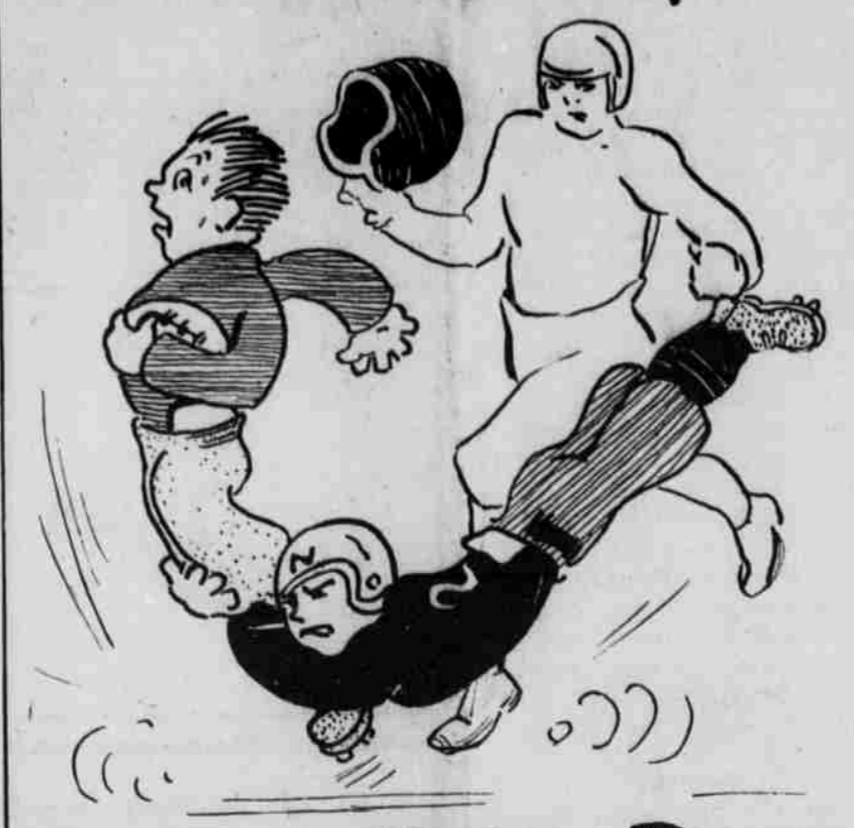
The Bizad, a monthly magazine, published by the Commercial club, is devoted to subjects of interest to business students. It contains articles dealing with student activities and articles by students and experts on economical subjects.

The official drive is scheduled to close Friday evening but the stadium committee decided Thursday that the campaign will be continued until the quota of 1,100 pledges is reached.

In the Sunday edition of the Daily Nebraskan a list of the fraternities and sororities whose freshmen have subscribed 100 per cent to the stadium will be published.

No accurate report on the progress of the campaign was available Thursday evening. A careful check will be made today or tomorrow and the report published, officials said.

800 TICKETS ARE SOLD

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### Expect Capacity Crowd at Game; Lincoln Fans Asked to Come Early

With clear weather there will be 23,000 at the Nebraska-Notre Dame game Saturday. This number will tax to the utmost the capacity of the unfinished stadium.

The large main entrances for each stand are blocked by the contractor's building machinery and will not be in use this year. Every available temporary entrance has been provided and all means have been taken to handle the crowd quickly and comfortably.

However, if everyone is to be seated at 2 p. m., at least 10,000 should plan to reach the stadium before 1:30. Several regular and special trains are scheduled to reach Lincoln for the game, some as late as 1:30.

It is requested that so far as possible, Lincoln people plan to be seated before the out-of-town guests arrive. Entertainment will be provided for a half-hour before the game.

Please come early and help us to avoid undue crowding at the entrances.

Students Will Meet at Armory at 7 O'clock for Pep Meeting Followed by March to Lincoln Hotel; Knute Rockne, Irish Mentor, Will Talk to Cornhusker Students.

### RECORD CROWD WILL SEE IRISH CONFLICT

J. K. Selleck, of Student Activities, Estimates 23,000 Will Attend.

The largest crowd ever assembled to witness a football game in the Missouri Valley will be on hand for the Nebraska-Notre Dame conflict on stadium field Saturday. John K. Selleck, student activities agent, estimates that over 23,000 people will witness the contest.

Temporary bleachers are being erected at the north and south ends of the stadium to take care of the record crowd. The east balcony and part of the section under the east balcony will not be ready for use.

4,000 from Omaha.

Omaha will send a delegation of more than 4,000 fans to the game. Two special trains will be required to care for the crowd from the metropolis. Mr. Selleck announced today that over 3,100 tickets had been sold in Omaha besides 500 that have been sold by mail. His agent in Omaha requested that more tickets be forwarded immediately.

One thousand high school athletes will be on hand for the conflict. A special race has been made to high school teams.

The entire Ames grid squad is making the trip here to see the Cornhuskers and the Irish mix. Several members of the Kansas Aggie squad are also expected to be on hand.

### EVERYTHING IS READY FOR GRIDIRON CLASSIC

#### Huskers Through Final Scrimmage; Notre Dame on Way; Crowds Coming.

Preparations for Saturday's football classic of America are completed. The Huskers have gone through their final scrimmage, Notre Dame is one the way, and the crowds are beginning to move toward Lincoln. Weather forecasts indicate a favorable day, the field is dry and hard, and members of both teams are in good physical condition.

Coach Rockne left South Bend Thursday afternoon with a squad of forty football players, composed of six ends, six tackles, six guards, three centers, three quarterbacks, four fullbacks and seven halfbacks. Evidently, he plans on taking no chances of losing the game through injuries.

**Fight to Win.**

In Thursday's workout Coach Dawson was using virtually the same team that faced Missouri, with the exception of Bassett who was alternating on plays with McGlasson who was shifted from guard. Hubka was working in Mac's place at guard. Coach Dawson's old saying of "Nebraska is going to fight" was reigning supreme after the workout Thursday.

If Nebraska will fight as Notre Dame will fight she will win, fans say. Notre Dame is coming to revenge last year's defeat and the Huskers are all primed to hold the onslaught and chalk up some markers for themselves.

Nebraska has Notre Dame outweighed several pounds to the man, the Irish are no more superhuman than Nebraskans; the football smartness that they are said to possess is not much more than that of the home warriors.
