Professor Lantz Gives Radio Talk

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 A number of Universities and college offer extension or night courses either directly under the jurisdiction of the local council or as a regular part of curriculum work handled by an instructor in the institution as a part of his regular work. The University environment, including the various sciences with their excellent laboratories exhibits and specimens together with the general and departmental libraries, offers a wonderful background for the various crafts as essential to the Boy Scout program. and his club or fraternity experience.

WESSEEN WILL GIVE NIGHT RADIO TALK

Full Credit Granted for Business English and Letter Writing Through Extension

Professor Wesseen of the College of Business Administration will give a combined Radio-Correspondence course in Business English and letter writing beginning November 1. The Extension division of the University of Nebraska is sponsoring this course and University credit may be received for it.
 In his course Professor Wesseen introduces common mistakes in everyday English, many of which will provoke a hearty chuckle. Enrollment in this course is open to all and registration is now under way. The course will be given through KFAB (309.1).

Two hours of University credit will be given for a half hour spent every Tuesday evening at the radio and if one has been duly enrolled in the school. This does not mean, however, that one must be enrolled in the university. Announcements and assignments will be sent out by the Extension Division to enrolled students. All lessons should be sent to the office, and every lesson will be read graded and returned to the student with helpful comments.
 Other Courses May Be Given
 Similar courses have been given in past years by the University of Nebraska and other universities. It is believed that if this course proves to be a success then other courses might be given. These other courses would probably include languages, history and possibly mathematics and others. In the languages German, French, Spanish, and Latin would be included. American and foreign histories are the most likely to be given.

Throughout the present course English will be considered as a useful tool in everyday life. There will be a study of words including spelling, pronunciation, and use. The construction of sentences into effective work will be stressed and with

this punctuation will be considered as a practical art. Every topic will be illustrated with live examples from everyday speech and writing.
