Previous to the action of the faculty committee, old and new officers of the University Y. M. C. A. met to consider the skits. The Y officers advised that some other skit be substituted for the Sigma Delta Chi skit. They also expressed themselves as being dissatisfied with the plan of the whole program as presented in the manuscripts. Joe Hunt, president of the University Y. M. C. A., stated late Thursday that the officers felt that the skits did not overcome the difficulties of last year and left the Y open to the same criticism it faced last year.

Lack of merit, rather than real objectionability, was given by the faculty committee as the real reason for rejecting the skits. Members of the committee expressed the belief that the skits were on too low a plane, that they savored of cheap vaudeville, and that they were open to the same objections raised a year ago.
