

SCHOOLS ENTER TENNIS TOURNAMENT

Valley Net Championships Will Be at Stake on Nebraska Courts

Missouri Valley championship tennis meet, doubles and singles, will be played tomorrow and Saturday on university courts. Nine Valley schools are competing in the singles and eight in the doubles. If the weather is bad during the days of the meet matches will be played on the courts indoor in the basement of the Coliseum.

Tom Elliott, Glenn Davis, Carol Dubry, Charles Heacock, and Adolph Lewandowski will represent the University of Nebraska in the singles matches, but teams for the doubles have not yet been selected from these men. Approximately twenty-seven men from Missouri Valley colleges will be in Lincoln this weekend to participate in the championship tennis meet.

With the exception of Drake, all colleges in the conference will enter teams in the meet. The University of Kansas will enter no men in the doubles contests, but with that excep-

tion all have entered men in both singles and doubles. Grinnell, Oklahoma A. and M., Iowa State, Kansas Agricultural College, University of Kansas, University of Missouri, University of Nebraska, University of Oklahoma, and Washington university will compete in the meets.

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NEW RECORDS MADE IN YEARLING TRACK

Tomson, Gallaway, and Half-Mile Relay Team Hold Records in Valley Freshman Books

In winning the eighth annual Missouri Valley conference freshman telegraphic track meet held on the home courses of each of the ten Valley schools May 8-14, University of Nebraska yearling who scored 63 1-2 points broke two of the meet records and established one in a new event, according to the results announced by Secretary Arthur Eilers of Washington university, St. Louis, Mo.

Eight of the standing meet records were bettered in the 1928 competition. Tomson, former Lincoln high star and Husker yearling, smashed the mark of 23 feet, 2 inches, held by Thornhill of Kansas, with his 23 feet, 9 3-8 inches. The Nebraska half-mile relay team composed of Bailey, Griswold, Tomson, and Becker, set a new record of 1 minute, 30.2 seconds in that event.

Gallaway of Nebraska holds the record in the 35-pound weight throw, a new event, with his heave of 43 feet, 9 inches. Hager of Iowa State stepped the 110-yard high hurdles in 15.3 seconds and the 220 low barriers in 25.1 seconds for new marks. Putnam, also of Iowa State, put the mile and two mile records into the discard being clocked in the mile in 4 minutes, 25.5 seconds, and the two mile event in 9 minutes, 42.2 seconds.

Trueblood Sets New Mark
Trueblood, who holds the Kansas state high school record in the event and is finishing his first year at the Jayhawk school, set up a new mark of 12 feet, 4 1-2 inches in the pole vault. Another Kansas university freshman, Lagerquist, bettered the mark held by Earl Wyatt of Nebraska, in the quarter-mile by stepping the distance in 50.4 seconds.

The five high places were awarded points in the standings. Besides winning the broad jump Tomson took third in the 100-yard dash, while Becker, Nebraska, took second in the 220-yard dash.

Other Huskers who scored were: Bailey and True, third and fifth respectively in the quarter-mile dash; Strickland and Downey, third and fourth in the mile; Lamson and Ragnains, second and third in the high hurdles; Lamson, second in the low hurdles; Dean, fourth in the pole vault; Griswold, second in the broad jump; Gilbert, fifth in the discus; Rowley, third in the shot; Bevard, third in the javelin. Nebraska also won the mile relay in 3 minutes, 30.5 seconds.
