Stress Is Put on Punting And Passing by Mentor as Contest Nears

TWO PRACTICES REMAIN Iowa State-Nebraska Tussle Opens Cornhusker's Big Grid Schedule

The Cornhusker power house spent last night in a long drill on punting and the aerial game. Coach Bearg is stressing these two phases of the gridiron game; his week and will give his Scarlet and Cream warriors a long session of it in the two remaining practice days.

Nebraska's football squad will pull away from Lincoln Thursday night at midnight for the strong-hold of the Iowa State Cyclones and the opening game of the Big Six season. Coach Bearg will take a large squad of football men with him for the initial game. The starting lineup will not be announced until later but the probable backfield will find Blue Howell and Clair Sloan at the halfback positions, with George Farley at full and "Red" Russell at the signal calling post.

Ames Points For Huskers. The Iowa State eleven is pointing for the Nebraska crew this year and will stop at nothing but victory over the Cornhusker eleven. Coach Noel Workman has spent one week of defensive work with his Cyclone squad, drilling on defensive plays to stop the powerful line and the powerful backfield of Nebraska's Scarlet and Cream eleven. The Nebraska coaching staff is aware of the great spirit that is prevailing on the Iowa State campus. Beat Nebraska and stop the Huskers is the byword of every Cyclone football rooter.

Iowa State and Nebraska opened the Missouri Valley season last year and the Cornhuskers were barely able to eke out a 6 to 0 victory. This year the eleven facing the Huskers at Ames will be a decidedly different Cyclone eleven. Victory is the password for the Ames eleven and they are determined to beat the Nebraska eleven on the home field before the first football crowd of the season. Combined with a heavy team and a fast backfield the sturdy Nebraskans will have their hands full to stop the Cyclones.

SIMPSON-DRAKE WILL CONTEST AFTER DARK

"Night Football" Is Novel Idea Used by Bulldog Grid Team

Forty-eight thousand watts of electrical energy will flood the Drake stadium with light when eleven moleskin clad Bulldogs take the arena in battle formation at 8 p. m. a week from Saturday night.

The dazzling splendor of the Arabian nights spectacle which greets the eyes of the curious thousands seated in the stands will again stamp Drake university as a pioneer in sensational athletic ventures.

"Night football" is the watchword on the tongues of hundreds who have never before witnessed a football game. "Night football" the marvel of modern science, will bring the game before their faces in a manner never before witnessed by a western or middlewestern crowd of sport fans.

On the other side of the gridiron have been installed six giant poles, nearly three feet in diameter at the base, and reaching into the sky to attain a height of more than fifty feet. To each of these poles will be attached two giant duplex flood light projectors, manufactured by Cahill Brothers, electrical engineers of New York City.

Each of the duplex projectors will contain two 1,600 watt bulbs. Twelve such projectors, two to a pole, will line each side of the field. Fear of a harsh glare in the eyes of the spectators and the players themselves, has been silenced by the engineers in charge of the project thru the use of special non-glare chemical treatment. Each of the projectors has been so treated as to allow the use of standard clear glass bulbs, with the highest lighting efficiency.

"The glare has been so eliminated that one can look straight into the light from a reasonable distance without being inconvenienced by it," declares George F. Cahill, designer of the flood light projectors.

Shadows, too, will be eliminated by the scientific crossing of the rays of lights in four directions. The players will be free of all interference in their play from shadows of other running players, shadows of the ball in flight thru the air, etc.

The University of Cincinnati was the first school to play night football on their regular schedule. The second to fall in line was William

and Mary college at Williamsburg, Va., the second oldest college in the western world. A third, in addition to Drake, will play night football this year, but it is also an eastern college—College of Emory and Henry—also in Virginia.

All of these institutions, however, are far below the athletic prominence achieved and maintained for some years by Drake University, and the local officials claim to be the first major institution to try the evening sport.

Furthermore, it is pointed out by engineers for the Des Moines Electric company, public utility organization which is installing the apparatus in the stadium, the Drake field will be lighted more completely than any other which has been used at night in a regularly scheduled game.

Mr. Barklage of Omaha clarified the statement when he claimed that the stadium will be 150 percent as light as the average well lighted office or storeroom when the Drake and Simpson players run onto the field less than ten days hence.

The success of the Simpson game, from the standpoint of good football and from the standpoint of more important standpoint of gate receipts, will determine whether or not further games will be played this season.

In the event of success, the Drake-Grinnell game, to be played as the Homecoming card on Saturday, Oct. 20, will be played at night to acquaint the hordes of homecoming alumni with the newest there is in athletics.

No more than two high games will be played here this year due to uncertain weather conditions late in November when the two remaining home games will be played.

It will be remembered that the aerial game of the Jayhawkers last season was very effective against the Cornhuskers and that Mr. Cooper was on the hurling end with Lawrence on the receiving post.

Coach Gwinn Henry, Missouri football tutor, sent his Tiger squad against the Freshman team last Saturday and during the full time scrimmage he used four complete teams which would indicate that the Tiger coach will have plenty of reserve material this season. In the varsity-fresh game, the varsity marked up four touchdowns and held the yearlings scoreless. Kern Reece, powerful sophomore backfield ace made two touchdowns with the first eleven.

Army's football team faces a strenuous week of preparation for the game next Saturday with S. M. U. at the West Point stadium. Captain "Biff" Jones and his corps of assistant coaches are deeply concerned over this game which ranks

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as one of the most important during the entire season. The Mustangs accompanied by 1,500 Texans are making the journey determined to win and take the Army mule back to Texas. Army's line will outweigh the Mustangs on an average of eight pounds. This is because of Perry, 207-pound right tackle and Sprague, 212-pound left tackle. But in the backfield the Cadets are outweighed by an average of about six pounds.

Junior Coen, the greatest young has enrolled at the University of

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
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
