

### DOPE SHEET AWARDS FIRST TO KAPPA SIGNS

#### Lewis Prepares Scores For Greeks Sports; Decides Winner of Cup

### DELTA TAU'S SECOND

A score sheet compiled by Jimmie Lewis, tabulating the total points scored in interfraternity athletic competition throughout the year, indicates that Kappa Sigma will win the all-around athletic championship for the third successive year. The award symbol of the championship is the Jack Best trophy, a large silver loving cup, which becomes the permanent property of the group winning each year.

Delta Tau Delta is a close second to the Kappa Sigma group, and some tournament points remain unrecorded, but the Kappa Sigas, with a point total of 572, are apparently safely out in front.

The Delta now have a total of 513. The tournaments unrecorded are wrestling, bowling, handball, horseshoe, golf, and tennis. In all of these, both fraternities will receive entrance points. The only possible differences are in additional points for placing in tournaments. Wrestling and tennis may be counted out, since neither group placed.

#### Award Several Points

Kappa Sigma will be awarded a few points for a third place in the bowling contest. Delta Tau Delta has points coming for handball, horseshoe, golf, and mid-winter

track. The highest possible number in each of these is 15, 15, 25, and 40 respectively, figured according to places won.

According to these figures, Kappa Sigma has a lead of 159 points. Delta Tau Delta, the closest rival, cannot possibly take up more than 38 of this lead.

The lead piled up by the prospective winners is due in part to winning of two of the major events of the interfraternity sports program. Kappa Sigma annexed a first in class A basketball, and another in the mid-winter track meet.

In addition, the fraternity won a third in cross-country and a third in spring track. Other points were awarded for entrance in various sports, and for progress in tournaments.

He was also associated with the Cornhusker, Argonaut, and Prairie Schooner staffs. He intends to work on The Lincoln Journal during the summer months.

The newly appointed associate editor, Joyce Ayres, is a member of Alpha Tau Omega, Sigma Delta Chi, Pi Epsilon Pi, Gamma Lambda, Kappa Kappa Gamma, and Phi Kappa Psi. He also has served on the Cornhusker and Argonaut staffs. Ayres will attend summer school in Lincoln.
