Raymond, who directed the annual Christmas concert for thirty years. Since her death five years ago, Mr. Kirkpatrick has directed the Christmas oratorio each year.**

**Waldo Weidel, University of Nebraska student, recently accompanied A. T. Hill, and A. M. Brooking of the Hastings museum on a survey trip along the Loup river. During the investigation of the several Indian village sites, traces were found of an early mission which was burned by the Sioux in 1846.**

**In 1834 Rev. John Dunbar and Samuel Allis were sent to this state by the Presbyterian board of missions for the purpose of converting the Pawnee Indians to the Christian religion.**

**Mr. Allis went with the Skiddi band who were then living in their village about five miles northwest of the present town of Palmer. He was there for some time but later left and located somewhere east of the present town of Fullerton where he built a mission school at the mouth of Plum creek.**

**Burned in 1846.**  
He carried on his work in that vicinity with varying degrees of success until the year 1846 when the Sioux raided the Pawnees and burned their village so that they were forced to flee eastward.

**The site of this old mission has been repeatedly sought by many interested students who have wished to learn its exact location but it has never been definitely found until the present time, probably from the fact that for some unknown reason the names of Council and Plum creeks have been exactly reversed.**

**This fact was brought to the attention of the Hastings museum officials some time ago and the suspicion arose that most of the searches were looking for the site on the wrong creek. A study of the various financial plans for the construction of such buildings, the facilities of-fered by them, and the part they play in the affairs of the univer-sities at which they are located.

**Additional Features.**  
Student council members agreed that there was a pressing need for an organized student center at this school. In addition to furnishing club rooms for campus extra-cur-ricular groups a building of this nature would contain lounges, in-door sport facilities, a swimming pool to be open to men and women students on respective days and reading rooms.

The largest problem before the council, it was indicated, will be to determine whether the majority of students really favor such a project, and then to devise a means of financing it. Council members doubted whether it would be possible to obtain any help from the legislature, but rather felt that such a drive would have to be solely a student project with some arrangement with the administra-tion whereby a certain fee could be collected from students at each registration period.

**Paid With Registration.**  
This fee, the amount of it to be determined by the cost of the building and method of payment, would be paid along with the reg-ular registration and would be ap-plied to the payments on the build-ing.

Members of the committee re-ported that they would start im-mediate investigations as to the feasibility of the new plan. Op-inions are to be gathered from the faculty, administration, students, and alumni associations, while other representatives will be dele-gated to study activity centers at other schools during the holidays.
