

CLASS A TEAMS COMPLETE THIRD ROUND OF PLAY

Final Contests to Decide
Champions to Be Held
After Vacation.

Basketball teams in class A of the intramural tournament have completed the third round of play. The final competition to determine the league champions will be held the first week after the Christmas vacation, according to Rudy Voegeler, director of intramural athletics.

Meet for Cornhusker
Varsity Crew.

Coach Henry F. Schulte will send his track charges through a "feel out" meet Friday afternoon as a preliminary to the heavy work which will get under way immediately after vacation. The men have been working out the last few weeks and every candidate for the varsity has been urged to compete.

The events will follow the regular tri-color meet order: mile run, pole vault, shot put, high jump, 60 yard dash, high hurdles, low hurdles, half mile, 440 yard dash and broad jump. The meet starts at 4 o'clock with the events being run off in order.

The athletic department of the University of Nebraska will conduct a special instructional course for basketball coaches and officials Friday and Saturday at the coliseum.

The school will be in the charge of Coaches Charley Black and Harold Browne. Two nationally known officials, E. C. Quigley and Leslie Edmonds, will speak to the coaches and officials attending the meeting.

Following the course, the coaches and officials from the high schools will be entertained at the Pittsburgh-Nebraska basketball game Friday evening.
