**FAMOUS TEACHERS TO BE AT AMES SESSION**

Three Guest Educators to Come to Iofa State Summer School.

AMES, Ia.—Three outstanding authorities in the fields of botany, animal husbandry and physiology, bacteriology and chemistry will be guest professors on the staff of Iowa State college during the summer session, according to J. E. Foster, dean of the summer session.

Prof. John Hammond, physiologist at the animal nutrition institute, school of agriculture, Cambridge university, England, will teach courses for teachers and advanced students in animal physiology, nutrition, reproduction, and associated fields during the first term.

Dr. A. J. Kluyver, professor of microbiology, Technical university, Delft, Holland, will conduct work in the field of physiology and biochemistry of micro-organisms during the first term. Emphasis will be placed on the mechanism of the assimilation and dissimilation of carbohydrates.

Dr. B. M. Daggard professor of plant physiology and applied botany, University of Wisconsin, will give two courses during the first term for college teachers and research workers. One course will deal with physiological methods and the other with such problems as the role of enzymes in the storage of grains, in fungi, utilization of agricultural wastes and other processes.

The first summer term opens June 14 and closes July 21.

"Super Engineer."

He characterized Hoover as the super engineer" who after graduation from Leland Stanford in 1895 took a position with a British firm and traveled as a "wanderer of the wasteland," making occasional visits to the United States, until 1914 when he returned to assist President Wilson.

Mr. Lawrence reviewed each president's "home and foreign" training prior to assuming office from Washington to Hoover. He concluded that those who have spent time abroad "are naturally influenced in their attitude on foreign entanglements."

"George Washington had no contact with foreign nations except through their representatives in this country," Lawrence said. "Therefore he was justified in giving us that timely advice in his farewell address to keep away from entangling alliances.

Indelible Impression.

"As we examine Washington's advice we get an indelible impression that environment affects a president's wisdom, policies and attitude."

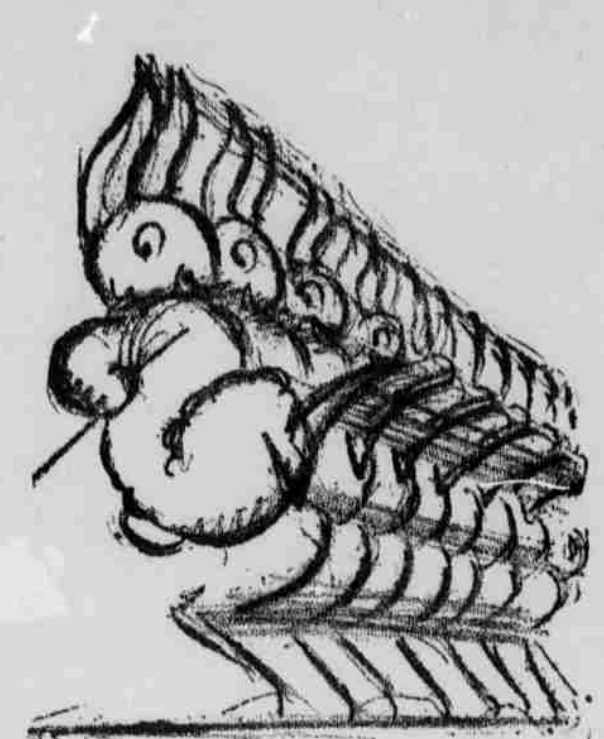
