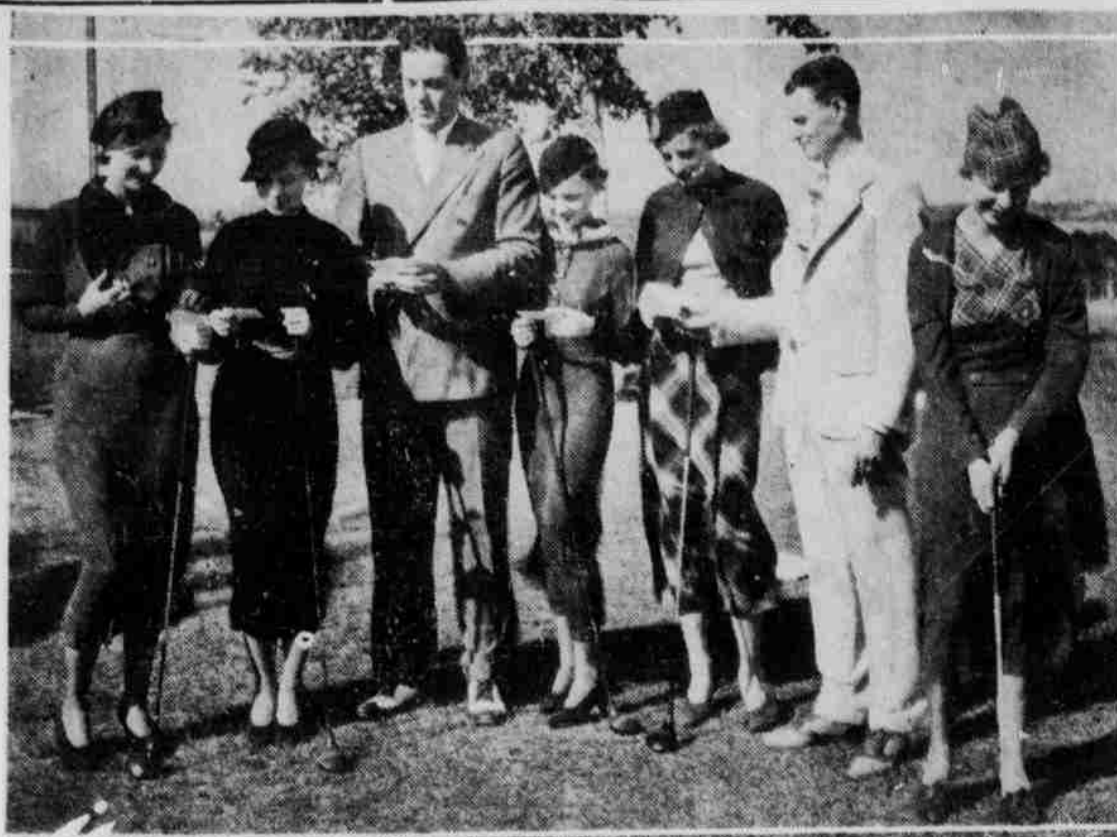

Rich Ore Deposits in Mexico Await Development by American Capital, Believes E. F. Schramm, Geologist

It will be only a question of time until the large companies of the United States will move into Mexico to develop some of the largest and richest ore fields in America, according to Prof. E. F. Schramm, geology instructor, who spent the past summer investigating the ore deposits around San Luis in Mexico.

Professor Schramm, who has conducted several similar expeditions in the past, stated that in central and northern Mexico there are larger and richer deposits of lead silver, zinc, and copper than have ever been uncovered in the United States. Although there are a few gold fields, they are of no great importance.

"One of the pleasing features of working in Mexico is that one encounters no difficulties in securing labor," Professor Schramm said. "Labor unions are unknown and one may secure good miners for

as little as a dollar a day (United States money)."

The national government working through the various states protects the working men. That is the only approach to labor organization that is known. According to the law, each man shall be paid every day in cash. This is required so that unscrupulous operators may cheat their rightful wages from laboring men who can generally neither read nor write.

Contrary to common report, Mexico has some fine laws, Mr. Schramm asserted. Foreign companies coming into Mexico to develop the mines encounter no difficulties as long as they abide by the Mexican laws. They are, in fact, encouraged to work the fields. At the present time the government is at work trying to interest United States capital in opening up more fields, and before long the richest ore fields in North America will be uncovered, Professor Schramm stated.

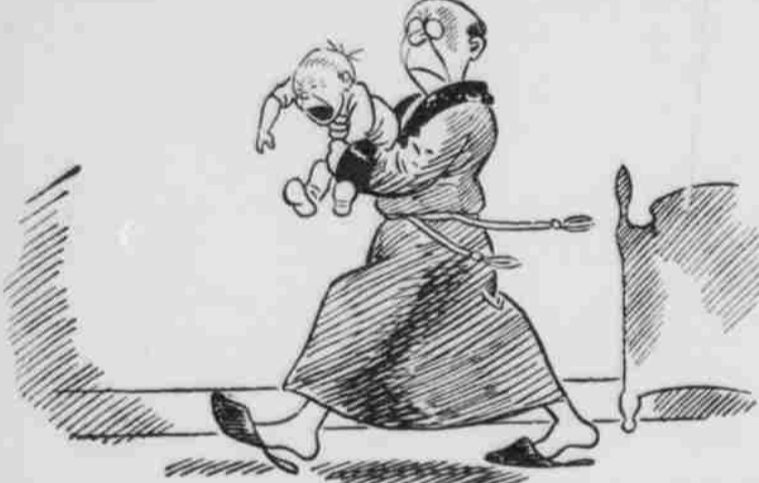
