

PARTY SPLIT ROCKS CAMPUS

THIRD FACTION IS GREEN TOGAS

Precedent Blasted With Organization of New Political Party Gathering Twenty Houses Into Fold; Seventeen Left for Old Factions.

SELECT CLASS CANDIDATES.

Break Culminates Strife Open in Old Parties; Finkle President of New Organization; Sauer Is Senior Contestant for Office.

Splits, hasty reorganizations and complete realignment of factions were the concluding steps in pre-election political turmoil that blasted precedent and resulted Friday in a new party, the Green Togas.

Gathering twenty houses to the fold, the new faction left old Blue Shirt and Yellow Jacket associates with a combined strength of seventeen fraternities. Eleven Blue Shirt houses remain, and the split leaves six members in the Yellow Jacket lineup.

GERMANY JUSTIFIED STATES PROFESSOR

Werkmeister Favors Recent Withdrawal From League Of Nations.

"Germany, in my opinion, has been wise to withdraw from the League of Nations," stated Dr. W. H. Werkmeister, assistant professor of philosophy of the university, in a talk to the Delian-Upsilon Literary Society, Friday night in Delian-Union Hall, Temple building.

Professor Werkmeister, who visited Germany this summer in order that he might secure the correct information about the present Hitler regime, said that Germany should have withdrawn from the league ten years ago, or in other words, should never have entered. He also mentioned that the German people think the United States is very wise for holding aloof from the affairs of the League of Nations.

No Persecution of Jews. There appeared to be no persecution of the Jews in the opinion of Dr. Werkmeister. A Nazi officer directed him to the busiest store in Berlin, which was owned and run by Jews, because a certain article he wished to purchase could be obtained more cheaply there. Signs of Jewish stores are not molested nor are there any acts of violence toward the Jews to be seen in contrast with the treatment of any other regular citizen of Germany.

Pfeiler Photographs Flag. Professor Werkmeister mentioned that his colleague, Dr. W. K. Pfeiler narrowly escaped being hit on the head with a club by taking a picture of the Nazi flag. Either you must salute this flag, or if you refuse you must take a picture of it or walk around the block to avoid passing it.

The program preceding Dr. Werkmeister's talk was in charge of Dorothy Gerhard and Leonard Westbrook and consisted of skits, instrumental and vocal solos, and impromptu talks.
