

With the facilities of a model drug store, commercial pharmacy is taught in the university. This drug store represents the well-planned, efficient, up-to-date store of today, and is designed to give the student actual experience in buying and selling goods, arranging articles for sale, decorating show windows and show cases, and writing advertisements. As many as twenty students may be seated in the room, while one person acts as salesman, and another as customer. After practical study and discussion, the students, by working in this model store, learn what to say and do by actually going through the processes. Co-operation Emphasized. In teaching this commercial course, the co-operation between druggist and doctor is emphasized. Students are made to realize the importance of fairness and frankness on the part of the druggist in selling medicines which will really benefit rather than do harm. Druggists may even have a large part in aiding the health services, says W. R. Neville, professor of pharmacy. Students also learn to apply the



Outline Parade.
