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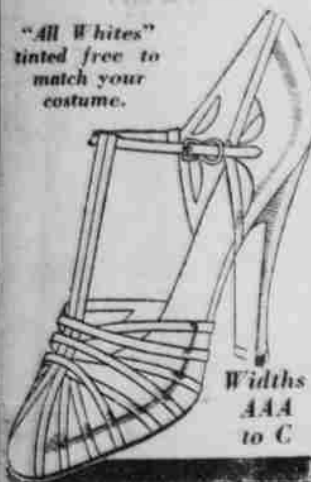

'HALO' COIFFURES ARE POPULAR THIS SEASON

A head start on being ultra-smart naturally begins with the head and a lovely coiffure is necessary with a lovely gown!

An off-the-face arrangement is popular this season. The forehead shows, the sides of the face, and above all, the tips of the ears. Waves run back rather than down and are soft and vague.

The general line for all coiffures is high and the sides are shorter. Back trickery is kept close to or above the nape of the neck, and often the hair is cut away under the first row of curls. Many women find dressy arrangements, rich in soft curls at the back, quite flattering.

At the moment the "halo" coiffures are important. Short or shoulder length hair is necessary for this soft roll of hair or curls across the crown of the head, framing the face with an angelic smartness.

The new hair line started with the advent of the Alice in Wonderland headband which has been popular for evening wear.

An outgrowth of this headband and similar to it is the diadem which is in keeping with this season's regal looking clothes. The jeweled diadem is especially at-

tractive and they are also featured in shell.
The Alice-in-Wonderland band has also appeared in flower form. It is made of gold flowers and incidentally, flowers are the gayest thing you can wear in your hair.
Rhinestone hair clips and rhinestone-combs are worn with the hair brushed back and seem to be keeping it off the face. Wing or feather clips, worn at either side of the head, give an air of flight and are especially lovely.

EFFECT HARMONIZATION IN FROCK AND SLIPPERS

When milady "puts her best foot forward" she'll be wearing lovely evening slippers that are decidedly "1933."

First of all in importance are satin or crepe slippers that may be dyed to match the gown.

Second in importance are the white fabrics combined with silver or gilt kid—an important note in this day when gold and silver lame are much in vogue, and the all-over silver or gold kid slippers.

Third are the velvet evening slippers in jewel tones that are very elegant with velvet evening gowns.

Slippers may match the gloves in color, and with black dresses black slippers fit up with white are new.

Sequins Are Effective.
Dull velvets and crepes may be brightened by contrast of shimmering sequins on shoes, and to tie-in with two material dress, satin and crepe are combined in sandals.

The smart Parisienne chooses palest green, silvery and nacre in tone to wear with white evening clothes.

Smoky taupe hose are worn with eel and the varying shades

of taupe and medium blues. French women feel that light stockings cut the line of the body too sharply and they say that the darker the stocking the slimmer the ankle.

GLOVES ARE BRIGHT NOTE TO CONTRAST WITH FORMAL DRESS

Gloves that go out in the evening are not worn as a mere covering for the hands but more as something to replace the chiffon handkerchief.

Highlighted for evening wear are the twelve and sixteen button gaiter and suede gloves and those of velvet and satin. Those of velvet and thick satin should not fit like kid gloves, but are worn as a bright note of color against the dress. These are a bit of nonsense for evening wear.

Many smart evening gloves end half way between the wrist and the elbow. They can be pulled on or off or tucked under or over bracelets. A new smart way to wear six button gloves is to smooth them out to wear bracelets over them.

VELVET WRAPS IN DULL COLORS ARE PREFERRED

No evening attire is complete without a formal wrap to lend grace and elegance to the carefully selected gown. There is a marked tendency this season toward having one particularly stunning wrap in a color that will harmonize with many frocks than several of a lesser loveliness.
