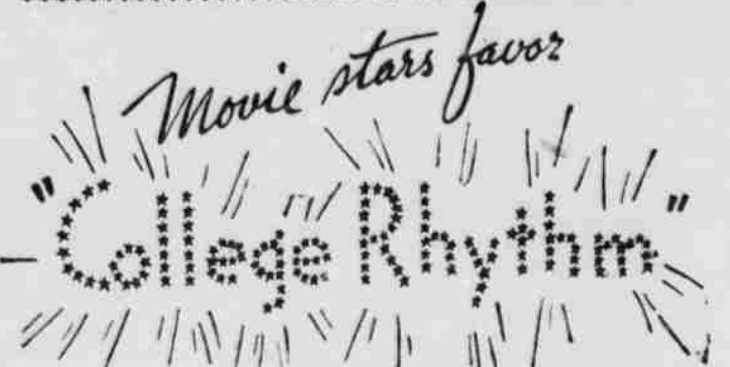
### DEADLINE FOR CAGE ENTRIES EXTENDED
