HUSKER MERMEN FALL VICTIMS TO VIKINGS 57 TO 27

Lynde High Point Man Dual Meet, but Well Balanced Gophers Too Powerful.

Minnesota wins again! The Husker swimming team was the victim this time, the Gophers more than doubling the score on the Nebraskaans, 57 to 27, in the first dual meet of the season held at the coliseum Friday.

Minnesota scored grand slams in the 440 yard free style relay, the 200 yard breast stroke, the 150 yard backstroke and the 220 yard free style splash. The only firsts Nebraska took were in the 300 yard medley relay and Lynde's first in the 100 yard free style splash.

Lynde High Point. High point man of both teams was Glyndon Lynde, Big Six champion in the 50, 100 and 220 yard dashes. The lengthy senior Hartington garnered ten points by virtue of winning the 100 yard dash, placing second in the 50 yard dash and swimming the crawl on the winning medley relay team. Webb was the high point man of the Minnesota team, gathering in a total of seven points in the 400 yard free style relay and the 150 yard back stroke.

HUSKER MATMEN WHITEWASH K. U. IN 32-0 TRIUMPH

Nebraskans Score Pair Falls, Four Decisions to Take Clean Sweep of Bouts.

By the lopsided score of 32 to 0, Nebraska wrestlers downed the Kansas Jayhawkers Friday night at the coliseum.

A ten point advantage was given Nebraska at the start thru forfeits in the 118 and 126 lb. classes. Kansas didn't have a chance at any time, Nebraska scoring two falls worth five points each, and four decisions good for three points each to account for the rest of the scoring.

The first fall was secured by Husker Ray "Suede" Larson in the 145 lb. division. He used the half nelson and body chanceller to mat Jim Boutz's shoulders to the mat the required two seconds. Captain Bernard "Benno" Funken finished the meet in a very acceptable manner by pinning heavyweight Sam Erickson of the Kansasans.

The most colorful match of the evening was furnished by Husker Don "Flash" Flansick and Gus Anneberg in the 165 lb. class. Flash gained all of his advantage in the early minutes of the bout, spinning Anneberg around in an airplane spin and then throwing him into a power dive on to the mat. Anneberg's aeronautical experiences proved a bit too much for him and Flash was able to keep him pretty well under control. Later, however, the Kansas recovered enough to keep out of Flansick's reach and Flash had to be contented with a decision.

Fred Mallon, after a slow start, outclassed Jayhawker Sig Brunm to take the decision in the 155 lb. class. Tom McConnell and Loren "Dutch" Simmons of the Cornhusker outfit fought on even terms in the 175 lb. division. Simons finally registering the decision. Julius Wittman managed to stay on top of Bob Childs most of the time, thus gaining the 135 lb. decision.

Exhibition matches between Fred Webster and R. Smith, and Bill Luke and John Wink took the place of the forfeited matches. A large crowd attended in spite of the cold weather and seemed to approve of Coach Adams' efforts to secure continual and aggressive action.
