room in the hands of students three evenings each week. This work is now in progress.

6. Music Committee—This committee stands at the service of the entertainment, social, and visiting committees, and is thoroughly organized and ready for active work.

7. Visiting Committee—This committee has made nine visits to the homes of the people besides many individual visits to the settlement house.

8. Employment Bureau—Nothing of a practical nature has been reported in this department for the past month.

9. Committee on Supplies and Furnishings—In the province of this committee, the following supplies have been added to the settlement: one organ, one sofa, stereoscope with views, one carpet, one rocking chair, one coal scuttle, one wash stand, and a number of children's games. The needs in this department, as scheduled on the university bulletin, are still pressing, and your committee rely on the thoughtful liberality of students, faculty, and friends for the supplies actually needed to carry on the work as now outlined.

#### II—General Recommendations.

1. We again call the attention of all persons interested in this work to the needs as outlined in the first monthly report of your committee.

2. Your committee again recommend that the board of control choose a suitable designation whereby the college settlement house shall be generally known.

3. Your committee also recommend that the board of control take immediate steps to associate the college settlement of the University of Nebraska with the national college settlement association.

#### STANDING OF THE TEAMS.

#### JUNIOR—FRESHMAN GAME.

The junior and freshman football teams battled on the campus last Saturday for class supremacy. The juniors easily outplayed their opponents, but they had a hard time winning the game. It looked once as though the freshman were going to win by the score of four to nothing. This was averted in the latter part of the second half, by the juniors scoring a safety and later a touchdown from which no goal was kicked.

The freshmen made their score in the early part of the first half. After the kick off by the freshmen, the juniors got the ball on their own twenty yard line. By a fumble, ten yards was lost, on the next play no gain was made, and the ball was passed back to Morrison for a punt. The kick was blocked, and a freshman fell on the ball. It was the only score the freshmen made, and the only time they were any where near it.
