

## In the Gym.

Dr. Hastings was invited down to Crete last Saturday to take the physical measurements of the Doane college athletes. He spent Saturday and Monday in taking measurements, measuring in all, 19 athletes, a dozen of whom will be candidates for the track. With such a limited number of men to contest and some of these not especially adapted to the events which they propose to enter, Doane exhibits the greatest of interest in athletics, and while not boasting, seems to be determined to win in the coming state inter-collegiate meet. The pluck and spirit exhibited by Doane and the determination to practice every possible minute up to the time of the contest, might be emulated by Nebraska with good results. Nebraska undoubtedly has as good material as there is in the west. All we lack is simply the same spirit shown by these smaller institutions.

Mr. Richards of the Farmers and Merchants' Insurance company, has presented to each of the colleges contesting in the state meet, a handsomely framed photograph of the \$75 silver shield trophy. Mr. Richards evidently intends that all of the colleges shall see what the shield looks like, even if they do not get a chance to gaze on the genuine article.

Dr. Hastings has received a second challenge from Minnesota for a track meet with Nebraska, besides the proposed meet at Omaha this spring. Minnesota seems determined to meet us and she will doubtless be accommodated.

### PROSPECTS IN THE STATE MEET.

University athletes are doing a great deal of thinking these days on their chances of winning the state meet which comes May 14. The men are beginning to realize that the athletic board means to stand by its ruling to allow no one to enter any contest unless he is taking a course of physical training. The realization of this fact is causing a great many desirable athletes to register for physical training.

Thus far the chances of winning seem encouraging. Hansen and R. C. James have been practicing for the shot put. Hansen is showing up in his old time form and James will be a strong candidate against anybody. Although James has had scarcely any practice he putting the shot in remarkable style and is considered a very promising candidate. W. E. Andreson and B. M. La Salle are also showing up well for the shot put. Jewett and Lamar are practicing for the hammer throw and Turner, who has just come out the past week, is going to make everybody hustle to win either the shot put or hammer throw. Such a number of contestants means good records and if there are an equal number of candidates in the other events there would be no occasion to fear defeat.

R. Sawyer and A. S. Pearse have indicated their intention of practicing steadily for the mile run. L. S. Ryan, the old stand by, will also enter both events. With this material Nebraska expects to make a good showing, but there is still room for more candidates in this event.

For the 100 yard dash the University is basing its hopes on R. D. Andreson, Collett and La Salle. Collett has just started training this week and with training will make a hard man to beat.

For the 220 yard dash and the 440 yard run, R. D. Andreson, La Salle, W. E. Andreson and Pepoon have entered. In the running high jump La Salle, W. E. Andreson and Waterman must bear away the prize if it is to be carried away by the University. W. E. Andreson and Benedict are counted on to win this year's contest as they did last in the running broad jump.

Benedict will make it interesting for anybody in the pole vault as he has already beaten last year's record by eight inches.

W. E. Anderson will have to uphold the honor of the University alone in the hurdle race, as there are no other candidates. Here is where there is great need of men. As many as six contestants is the smallest number which could give proper competition in this event.

On field day, May 7, and in the outdoor pentathlon, Nebraska will be able to figure out to some extent her chances of winning from the showing made on these days.

### MILITARY ATHLETIC CONTEST.

The long talked of contest between "E" and "F," the pigmy companies of the regiment, will take place on the campus at 2 p. m. tomorrow. There is considerably friendly rivalry be-

tween the two companies and each will do its best to win.

Acoutrement race, prize a stick pin, Company E; Harvey Boose, Christie and Ames; Company F, Weeks, Benedict, Cleland and Robbins.

Three legged race, prize, neckties, Company E, Christie and Chapin, Davis and Skyles; Warner and Boose; Horn and Rose; Company F, Collett and Reed; Strook and Robertson.

Egg and spoon race, prize a cyclometer, Company E, Hopewell, Davis, Edwards and Lytle; Company F, Bourke, Adams, Ritter, and Inler.

Bucket race, prize, a shirt, Company E; Chapin, Edwards, Dickinson and Hanting, Company F, Strook, Antis, and Robbins.

Sack race, prize, a pair of tennis shoes, Company E; Davis, Skyles, Hopewell; and Schneid. Company F, Crawford, Strook, Stewart and Williams.

The final event will be a tug of war in which the total strength of each company will be tested. No ladder will be used but three trials will be given to see which company possesses the most muscle.

The commandant and majors will act as officials. Prizes for the winners of the events have been donated by the following firms: Burstead and Tuttle, Perkins and Sheldon, D. I. Smith, The Hardy Furniture company, C. M. Gardner Tailoring company, Sutton and Hollowbush.

If the weather does not permit the contest taking place outside, it will be held in the armory.

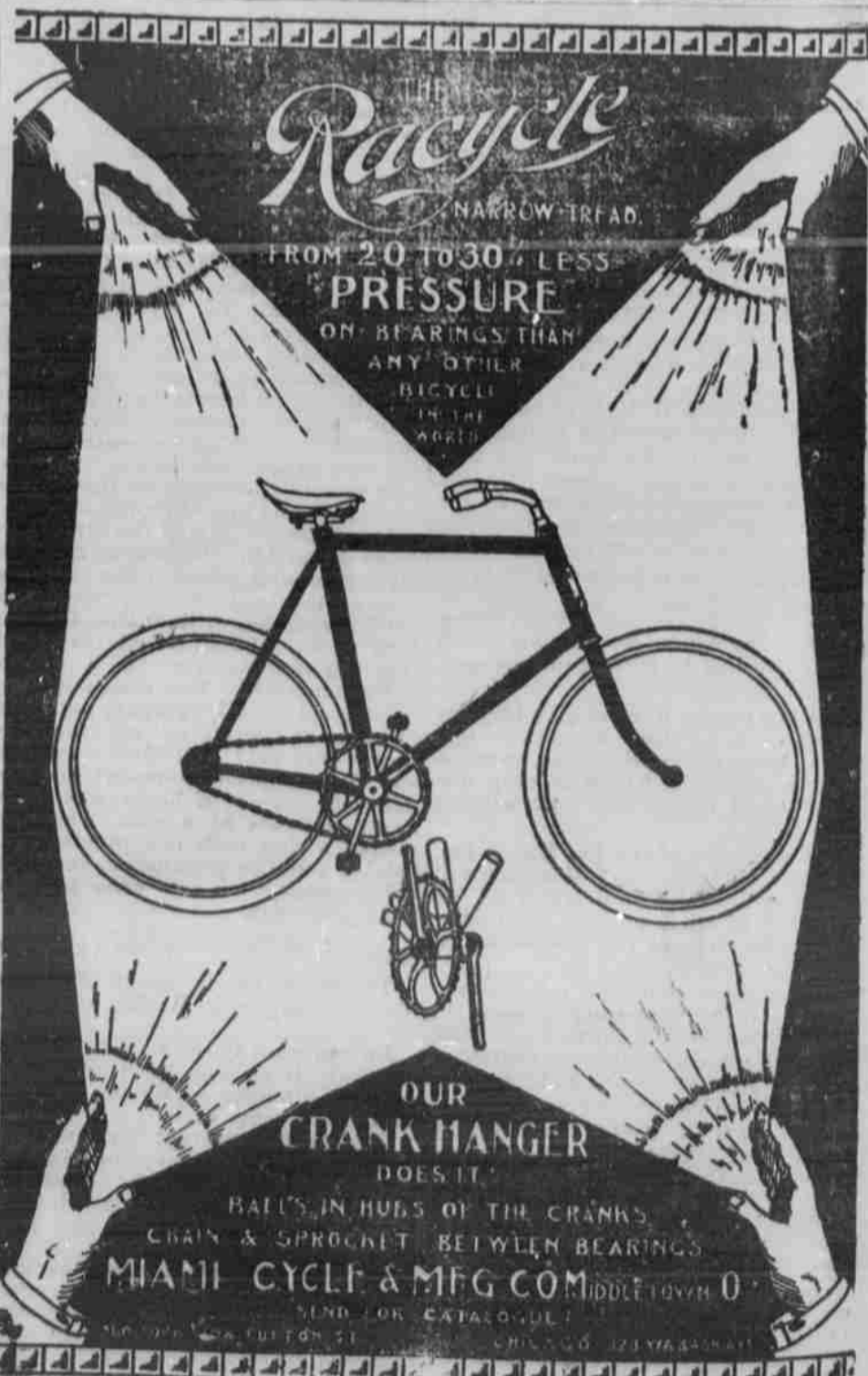
